

FOSTER'S GOLD ORDER.

The Washington Post of February 12th, gives the following interview with chairman Bland and Representative Bartine on the subject of Secretary Foster's order that no exchange be furnished to banks by sub-treasuries or the Treasury Department on New York unless the banks deposit gold to the amount of the exchange asked for, is viewed by free coinage members of the House as an attempt to create a "gold scare" for effect on free silver, coinage legislation.

Chairman Bland, of the committee speaking of the order said:

"I think (from information I have from private sources) that Mr. Foster by his proclamation that he is going to pay all the silver certificates in gold, and that everything including silver certificates, bullion certificates, and other obligations, were redeemable in gold, and that he was creating an uneasiness in European markets and is tending to create an apprehension there of a gold panic. The effort of Mr. Foster to intimidate the free coinage people here by his tactics in the Treasury Department may result in bringing on a gold panic, and thereby hasten the free coinage of silver, which is necessary to relieve the gold market."

Mr. Bartine, of Nevada, who is the Republican leader on free-coinage question, and who is recognized as one of the best informed men in the House on the subject, said:

"Of course, I do not know what the motive of the Secretary is, and I do not like to impugn it, but it does not seem to me that there has as yet been any run upon the Treasury sufficient to make such an order necessary. It is equivalent to a declaration that the silver dollar is not a good one, and I can imagine nothing that has a greater tendency to depreciate it. It seems to me that the Secretary is actually exceeding his authority in declining to receive a coin which, by express statutory enactment, is standard money and full legal tender."

Mr. Bartine said that the report which was going the rounds of the newspapers that he had stated that President Harrison would never dare veto a free coinage bill was incorrect. That would have been discourteous, and he did not pretend to say what the President would dare do. He had said that it was a matter of extreme doubt whether the President would veto the bill, and also that the threat of a veto was being used as a cudgel to stop legislation, and that Mr. Harrison did not want to be put in the position of having to veto or sign a free coinage bill. Mr. Bartine expressed the opinion that several Western States would be lost to the Republicans if a free coinage bill were vetoed and Mr. Harrison was the nominee against a Democrat on the silver question.
