**CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.**

The third trial of Charles Hawes for the killing of Richard Wagner, a drug clerk at Monterey last June, has begun at Solina.

Sherman P. Brown, who is from Kansas, is being sought for, having fallen heir by the death of an aunt to a large amount of money.

Two young colored lads of Lebanon Ohio, have been playing "Jack the Kisser" with the pretty white girls, to the indignation of the entire town.

New South Wales has a financial crisis on hand. Ten of the largest savings banks of Sydney have stopped payment, with disastrous prospects of liquidation.

Caruthers, fifteen miles south of Fresno, had a rabbit drive yesterday. Over 10,000 are reported to have been killed. Another drive is fixed for March the 14th.

The Rev. Richard Schofield, who was received into the Catholic Church by Cardinal Newman in 1850 at the age of fifty-eight, is enjoying good health in his one hundredth and first year.

The report comes from Philadelphia that an English trust has been formed, with \$5,000,000 capital, to consolidate all the tanneries of the United States, with headquarters in the East and a local branch in each State.

A Panama dispatch says: Nicaragua has granted the Louisiana lottery a perpetual charter. The principle office of the company will be at Greytown. It will have branches in all the other Central American republics.

Junction City, Mo., has a "Bellamy" club that does the cooking for forty-four families. It is a solution of the "hired-girl question," and the members are very enthusiastic. Last year \$3,250 were paid out for table supplies.

The mortality from measles in England is said to exceed anything that can thus far be attributed to the influenza. There are 13,000 deaths from measles annually in England and Wales, and the mortality has increased greatly during the last decade.

The Lord Mayor of London, who had been in communication with the Prince of Wales as to the disposition of the wedding gifts from the corporation intended for the Princess Mary of Teck, is said, "on the best authority," to have an intimation that it will be best to do nothing in the matter at present; and the rather practical explanation is given that the engagement of Prince George to an English Princess will shortly be announced. The wedding gifts will keep.

**A Prize Family.**

A remarkable story comes from the Census Office. It is said there is a white family in Montgomery county, Kentucky, named Willoughby. The age of the father, Henry, is 35, and that of the wife 32. They have had thirty-two children; the eldest, a boy, is 21, and the next child, a girl of 17. This would make the father but 14 and the mother but 11 when the first child was born, and necessitate the birth of a child every eighteen months subsequently. The census reports show many colored parents of ages running from 12 to 14 years, but there are few white mothers recorded less than 15 years.—Ex.

**Aladin's Cave.**

From Creede, Col., comes a tale of a fabulous discovery made by a prospector named Brandt. He had ascended an almost perpendicular wall and was nearly at the top, when he noticed a crevice like an opening large enough to admit his body. He entered, pushed forward, and, after a few steps, was within a cavern, the roof of which, vaulted and hanging with stalactites, showed croppings of silver ore running \$10,000 to the ton.

This chamber is 50 feet wide and 200 feet long, and contains utensils, skeletons and remains, evidently those of the cliff dwellers, but the antiquarian discovery is lost in the interest of the phenomenal silver find.

Brandt reported the find and the town of Creede, used as it is to the reports of big strikes, went wild. Hundreds left for the Cliff Dweller claim, as it is called, at once.

Brandt and his backer, Colonel Morton, were offered \$100,000 for the claim by a syndicate of California capitalists. They refused.
