

POSSIBLE CANDIDATES.

Behring Sea Treaty Signed.

A treaty for arbitration of the Behring Sea seal fishery question was signed Saturday on behalf of Great Britain and the United States. While the question is not advanced to the last stage of settlement it is well on the way. It is doubtful if it ever comes up again in a way to create any excitement in the country. The Board of Arbitration is to consist of seven persons—two from the United States, two from Great Britain and one each representing the governments of France, Sweden and Italy. The treaty is yet to be ratified by Congress and the British Parliament. But it having been signed by Blaine for the United States and Paunceforte for Great Britain, there is little doubt but it will be ratified by both countries. There will be a positive gain to the country in putting this vexed question to rest.

Mrs. Ferry, who lives on Red Bank Creek, ate a few volunteer parsnips on Wednesday, the 24th inst., and on Thursday, to all appearances died. The funeral was to have taken place on Friday, and every preparation had been made for the interment of the body. When the final arrangements had been made and just as the lid of the coffin was about to be fastened down, the body showed signs of life.
