

OUR COUNTRY.

Bread riots are raging over Germany. We believe if a storm should drive back from the shores of Great Britain the ships bound for that country, preventing their landing for a month, the bread riots would be as general in England as they are in Germany. We know that in Russia whole provinces are so destitute in food that the women and children are dying of starvation; we know that in China and India the people are on half rations almost from the cradle to the grave; and this being the rule any American who will stop to think for a moment will realize how infinitely superior our own country is to any other the wide world around. Not only have we the surplus food to feed the world, but we have the surplus cotton to keep the looms and spindles of the world in motion; and then from the mines every year there is gold and silver enough produced to make the lubricating fluid necessary to keep the boxes of business cool and the whole machinery of trade and commerce running at full speed. If our statesmen had but the sense to say to the world, "You poor half starved nations, do what you please."

"As for us, we believe the treasures of our hills were put there to be used as money; as this has been their chief use since the beginning of time, we are going to use them as money. We do not care how you look upon it. Ninety-seven per cent. of our trade is domestic trade. If we cannot meet the 3 per cent. that is sent abroad it will be most strange. At all events, while we have a continent to develop, all the roads and bridges and cities to build, all the mines to open, all the fields to cultivate and smooth, we are not going just at your dictum to give up the means we have at hand to buy the tools for this work. We do not want any conference. We are simply going to use our gold and silver in the best interest of the people, and if you do not come to our view of the matter, it will be all the worse for you." Then we could get along. Then we would have boom which reach from sea to sea, and all other nations in a single ten years would become second class compared with ours.—Salt Lake Tribune.
