New cases of typhus continue to develop at New York.

Fred Douglas has been appointed to represent Hayti at the World's Fair. An appropriation of \$25,000 has been made.

One of the large winter hotels in the Engadine is soon to be heated electrically by power derived from the Nura river.

It is rumored that a compromise is about to be effected in the Searles-Hopkins will case, now before the Massachusetts courts.

The sidewalks were packed with school children yesterday who followed the Uncle Tom's Cabin band, the streets being too muddy to walk on.

The vaqueros on the Milpitas ranch across the mountains from San Lucas, in Monterey county, are making preparations for a tug-of-war contest on horseback.

The box sheet for the Old Folk's Concert is now open. There is no need to urge an attendance. Every body is sure to go to their unique entertainment.

By the carelessness of a switchman a train telescoped another containing workmen, at Milwaukee, Wis. Seven men were killed. The switchman has disappeared.

The newly-discovered coal mines in the Argentine Republic have caused a cancellation of the contracts with England for coal for the railroads in that country.

The Minnesota House, at La Crosse, Wis., was burned Wednesday morning, and the proprietor, Peter Heiden, perished in the flames. The financial loss was small.

At the meeting of the Sportsman's Club Tuesday night a ranger by the name of C. S. Gregory made many good suggestions, and seemed to be considerable of a hunter himself.

Major-General George W. Cullum died at New York Tuesday after a brief illness of pneumonia. For the last three months he had been in poor health. He was 83 years old.

The microbe of the grip has been fully examined and is found to be in the shape of a capital letter H. It is believed that the other three letters were shaken off during a chill.

The inhabitants of Arva, Hungary are suffering from typhus and other deadly diseases, in addition to the famine prevailing there. People are reduced to such straits for food they are compelled to eat the barks of trees and pine cones.

Miss Rhoda Broughton has organized a successful movement at Philadelphia for a Home of Rest for Horses. The scheme is in practical operation, and insures greater kindness in the treatment of the class of animals for which it is designed.

Nearly all the Indians in British Columbia will assemble at the north arm of Fraser river on the Queen's birthday and hold a grand potlatch. Ten thousand dollars in prizes will be given away and 3,000 blankets distributed by Chief George.

Last week Mrs. Jane McMeekin, a lady 76 years of age made final proof on a homestead in Haystack country, Crook county, Or. She has lived continuously on the place for five years, as the law requires, and had certainly earned a title to the land.

Director General Davis of the World's Fair has received a communication announcing that the Grecian Government intends to send a complete representation of classical life to the exposition, and to this end will organize a manufacturing bureau to prepare casts of all the best pieces of ancient art now in Greece.

What will probably be the oldest exhibits at the World's Fair were received at the Custom House for "Monsieur" Potter Palmer. They were two Greek vases, of baked clay, made in the third and fourth centuries before Christ. They came from an antiquarian dealer in Paris, and were admitted free of duty as a collection of antiquities.

SPORTSMEN ORGANIZE.

The Capitol Hunting and Fishing Club in Shape.

Tuesday evening the Armory ante room was packed with hunters and fishermen who had paid their \$5 admission fee and subscribed their names to the list, which now contains 81 signatures.

Hume Yerington as temporary Chairman stated to the members that the intention of the club was to mass sufficient influence and interest to maintain the hunting lodge recently built at Washoe Lake by the efforts of the projectors, and to see that the laws relative to fish and game be rigidly enforced.

This statement brought forth a howl of applause from the interested throng, and they immediately proceeded to business.

A committee was appointed to draw up rules and regulations on the spot, and a recess was taken for that purpose.

In about an hour the committee appeared with their copy ready to be read. It was one of the most complete yet terse reports ever submitted to a body of men and covered the laws of the field and club without overlooking even the most minute details.

It was adopted almost as read, and will always be a protection to the organization. George Mills, T. R. Hofer and J. E. Jones of the Mint did the work.

The meeting room was the scene of bustle and activity from 8 o'clock to 12, and more real business was disposed of in that time than the 15th session of the Nevada Legislature consumed in 60 days.

It will be known as the Capitol Hunting and Fishing Club, throughout the Pacific States, and proposes to see that fish and game of the State is protected.

The officers are as follows: President, T. R. Hofer; Vice President, Geo. W. Kitzmeyer; Secretary, R. H. Davis; Treasurer, L. L. Elrod; Board of Control, T. R. Hofer; as Chairman, Frank McCullough, Abe Cohn, George Givevich and Hume Yerington.

Accommodations at the lake are most complete, there being a sleeping room, kitchen, stable and boat house, together with all necessary utensils to maintain the "Lodge."

The membership will be limited to 100, and any reputable sportsman (no bushwhackers or cannon hunters allowed) can secure information regarding admission from any officer of the club.

Considerable credit is due Hume Yerington, George Givevich, George Richard, T. R. Hofer and others, for the first interest displayed, and the tireless energy they have shown to bring the club to its present high standard.
