

BLAINE'S FAMILY.

It is astonishing to the thinking people of the country that Mr. James G. Blaine, the man of large diplomatic abilities, should not have been able to direct his powers in a wiser manner in his own family.

Years ago, when the character of his wife was assailed by an irresponsible newspaper, he brought the affair prominently before the world by a libel suit. This was looked upon by his friends as a grave mistake.

Now that his son's domestic troubles are about over he sets tongues and pens wagging all over the world again in discussion of the private home life of both his own and his son's families. The scurrilous attacks of prejudiced or incompetent people are oftentimes annoying, as is a mosquito bite, but they as soon pass away if treated with a philosophical disdain, backed by a consciousness of being right. The words of Judge Thomas would not have been remembered or spoken of except as a fine day's gossip. Blaine's letter led attention to the circumstance and invited retaliation from the divorced woman, who has accepted the challenge and demands publication of all her letters, by the eminent statesman, or threatens to publish them herself. In either event the public will expect to read these love letters. The whole business is sickening and decidedly unwise and ungratified.

One of the most interesting exhibits at the World's fair will be the models now being made by the Smithsonian institute showing the various phases in seal and walrus catching and killing in the Alaskan waters.

Since Governor Boyd got his hands on the reins of the Nebraska government he has called a few old war horses off the track. Yesterday he sent a span of World's Fair Commissioners back to their stables to wait for the derby which is to come off in a few years, and put on a new team.

The annual returns of the organized militia for the States which have recently been presented to Congress show a gratifying increase in numbers over last year and a still greater advance over a few years ago. Exclusive of three lately admitted States, whose statistics are lacking, the aggregate is 110,718.

Mr. Alexie, Mayor of Moscow, who has been commissioned to travel through the famine districts of Russia and report to the Czar on the subject, is given authority to spend 15,000,000 rubles in the purchase of corn, and to seize hoarded stocks at his discretion, paying therefor what he considers a just price for them.

Secretary Foster, who has sailed for Europe in search of health, said before his departure that he had not seen a well day since he went to New York last fall to make an address at the annual banquet of the Chamber of Commerce. It was at the annual banquet a year previously that Secretary Windom was stricken to death with heart disease.

Seven lepers are confined in the Pesthouse at San Francisco. Four of them are boys named Biret, who inherited the disease from their mother, and who came here from the Hawaiian Islands. They are in great dread of being sent to Molokai, the Hawaiian asylum for lepers. A young Chinese woman is among the number.

A lamp may be lit with a piece of ice. A small piece of metallic potassium is laid on the wick and touched with the ice, when the water immediately produces a flame. This is due to the property of this metal to oxidize with exceeding rapidity on contact with water. This curious experiment is to be made with great caution, as if too much of the potassium is used an explosion will take place.
