GET IN GENTS.

Reno and Virginia Follow Carson's Suit.

The following from the Enterprise shows how quick the Virginia people are to spot a good thing.

The Carson sportsmen, by their action in clubbing together to build bathhouses, hotels and other conveniences on the shores of Washoe Lake have stirred much of the blood which has been in comatose condition among their brethren of the Comstock during the long Winter—old sports who have long been hibernating, coming out of their holes and stretching themselves.

In accordance with the kindly invitation of the Carson folks to cooperate with them and preserve the dignity of sporting-men generally, a meeting was held last evening in the back parlors of Paterson & Ash's International Saloon, and a plan of operations was agreed upon; also the following officers were elected: President A. J. Enders, Vice-President Geo. I. Lamon, Secretary, A. C. Olds; Treasurer, J. P. Smith, Executive Committee—George Kieffer, H. H. Bailey, Wm. Ash, J. W. Scott and Fred Plunkett.

Among other well-known citizens either present or represented by proxy were, A. L. Sanford, Harvey Jackson, D. L. Brown, Sam Dowling, Jake Englebrecht, Tom Tucke, Milo McVillan, Jake Young, Joe Bleakley, Sheriff McCollough, Eugene Holland, T. M. Fillebrown, Wes. Paxton, Capt. M. C. Osborn, Con. Ahern, M. Flynn, Mike Young, Bart Burke, Bill Davis, Tom McGlynn and others too numerous to mention on this occasion.

Two hundred dollars was subscribed at the meeting, but this is only a nest-egg for what is to come. Captain Enders has already let a contract to Jake Englebrecht for the construction of about a dozen boats and in a few weeks our navy on the lake will startle our Carson cousins.

Every respectable hunter and fisherman is eligible to membership in the Comstock Sporting Club on the payment of \$5.

Meantime, Secretary Olds is instructed to enter into friendly diplomatic negotiations with the Ormsby Co. club, provision being made that the price of provisions in the shape of game and fish shall not be advanced, and that "Protection and Reciprocity" shall be the watchword.

The following from the Reno Journal shows that the fever has struck the Riverside town, and from the looks of things will reach into California:

Efforts are being made to organize a hunting and fishing club in Reno. Similar movements have been made before, but with little success. It is hoped that an organization will be effected in the near future, as there seems to be a strong disposition among some to violate the fish laws. Quite a number of Indian have left here recently for Wadsworth for the purpose of catching fish, which are now on their way up the river in large numbers. Reports come from there that white men as well as Indians are catching a great many. We have the finest waters in the State for fishing, and also as fine hunting grounds. There are a great many here who like to go out for a few hours in search of game and recreation from business, and they should stand in and help the movement along. Carson has just completed a most thorough organization, and we should not be outdone by them. By forming a club here and conferring with the clubs of Ormsby and Storey, any amendments or laws that would be considered beneficial to either county or the State at large, could be put before the State Legislature in a more systematic manner than heretofore, and with a strong probability of proving more satisfactory than some of the laws in the past. Let an organization be completed as soon as possible.
