SENATOR STEWART'S OPINION.

He Approves the Silver Movement in Unmistakable Language.

UNITED STATES SENATE, WASHINGTON D. C., April 19, 1892. Ed. Silver State—Your favor of the 11th instant is before me, enclosing an article with regard to the formation of silver clubs in Nevada and desiring my opinion on the subject.

Why should not the people of Nevada follow the example of New York and New England? The managers of both political parties in that section of the United States belong to the gold trust.

Their allegiance to the gold combination is above all parties. They represent the bondholders and money loaning class, and use the two political parties to advance the interests of their class.

I do not mean to be understood that the mass of the people of these sections are the enemies of the producing classes in the other sections of the country, but that the people have no voice.

What will become of the producing classes if they do not unite in the defense of their rights? The gold combination is organized to absorb the wealth of the people.

Why should not the producers of wealth take care of themselves, if they do not who will? What right has any enemy of the people of Nevada either to demand or expect the people of our State to vote for him for anything, if they do not want him?

A ball from the gold trust may come to the aid of the silver movement, but the silver movement who goes to the aid of the gold trust is a double agent.

I do not think it becoming in me to tender advice to the people. It might seem to be a violation of the rule. I have no objection to your publishing what you think fit, but I do not think it is best to divide while our enemies are united. I shall submit to the wisdom of the people.

Repairs or New Building. Ed. Appeal—I would like to ask whether the defeat of the proposed school bonds will also defeat the proposition of repairing the school house.

No. The question was discussed at the meeting as to the propriety of placing the words "For a New School Building" or "For Repairing the Old Building." It was held by the trustees that this would be cumbersome on the bill, but it was stated by Trustee Myers that if the bonds were beaten the Trustees would still feel authorized to go ahead with repairs to the extent of say \$5,000 and it is believed that \$5,000 would be quite sufficient to place the building in a very suitable condition. This amount is about all the taxpayers of Carson feel like standing at the present time.

Dark Days. It is high time that we were all up and doing for our best and foremost industry, silver. The closing down of the Candelaria, Tuscarora, Galena, Cortez and Grantville mines certainly makes the days look dark for Nevada.

It will not be long before Austin must join the way, if nothing can be done to improve the situation.

We can foresee that the worst has not come, in all probability; but it is certain it has not come if every effort is not put forth to have something done for silver.

Nothing can be accomplished by surrendering. We must not surrender.

Always with all party lines! We are all Nevadans. Let us fight for Nevada's interest.—Peoples Advocate.

THE SILVER FIGHT.

Teller to Lead the Battle for the White Metal.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Senators Teller, Mergan, Daniel and Sanders are said to have taken an active part during the past week in the secret proceedings of the National Silver Committee, which has been in session in this city. Twenty States were represented, and it has been said that the meeting was of more than ordinary importance.

It is stated by members of the Committee that a last effort will be made by the free coinage advocates at their convention which has been ordered to meet in Washington on May 26th, to ask one of the great political parties to incorporate in its platform a free coinage plank; that if efforts in that direction fail, the free coinage men will take steps to organize a third party, the basis of which will be the Farmers' Alliance, and all devoted advocates of free silver; that a convention will be called, at which Senator Teller will be nominated for President and Colonel Polk of the Farmers' Alliance for Vice-President, and a platform advocated containing but a single plank providing for the free and unlimited coinage of both gold and silver.

Friends of Senator Teller maintain that he will accept the nomination upon a strictly financial platform, provided the great parties nominate men unfriendly to free coinage. A gentleman familiar with the silver movement figures that Teller and Polk would certainly be able to carry the States of Georgia, Alabama, North and South Carolina, California, Nevada, Idaho, Kansas, Washington and Illinois have already shown with other candidates in Illinois, Missouri, Minnesota, Arkansas and Texas, and if unable to secure their election direct they would at least throw the choice of a President into the House, where it is claimed the free coinage candidate would be almost certain of election. The National Silver Committee will probably adjourn tomorrow.

Winnemucca to Colorado. WINNEMUCCA, April 25.—The following dispatch was sent from here today: "Winnemucca, Nevada, April 25, 1892. To State Silver Convention of Colorado, care M. P. Sater, Chairman Executive Committee, Denver, Colorado. Nevada sends greeting:—In the last ten days several thousand voters have signed Silver League rolls and pledged themselves to vote for no man for President unless he shall be unreservedly in favor of the free coinage of silver, and stand squarely on a free coinage platform, and still the ball is rolling. Such a candidate on such a platform will receive 95 per cent of the vote of the Battle Born State against Harrison, Cleveland or any other brace of goldbugs. The school children of Nevada are taking in the situation and are organizing juvenile silver leagues in order, if necessary to carry on the contest the coming generation. We pledge Nevada's three electoral votes for free coinage. (Signed.) Geo. S. Nixon, Pres. Winnemucca Silver League."
