COAST NEWS.

Deputy Corner J. A. Buck at San Diego Cal., is charged with robbing the dead.

The northern frontier is being closely guarded against an invasion by Chinese.

George W. Bruggy, the condemned murderer, who escaped from prison at Santa Rosa, has been recaptured in a canyon on Keys' ranch, near Windsor.

The county and railroad bridge across Rouge river at Gold Hill, Or., was set on fire by some miscreant, but the fire was discovered before any great damage was done.

The jury in the case of John D. Smith who killed Percy Williams at Fresno, Cal., during a quarrel over a game of cards more than one year ago, has disagreed and it is now believed that conviction is impossible.

A strong flow of artesian water has been struck in Pleasant Valley, Fresno County Cal., and the people of that section are delighted with the prospects of being able to irrigate their lands, which are far from other water supplies.

The people of Pomona Cal., are much alarmed at their inability to discover any trace of one of their business men, Louis Ackerman. He had money on his person when last seen and the idea of foul play is strongly gaining strength.

British Columbia sealers are beginning to realize that the United States are in earnest, and they count on the support of the British Minister of Marine to see that vessels are duly notified and summarily dealt with, as by instructions given by Secretary Tracy.

County Court Judge Cornwall of Lillolet, B. C., has sentenced Father Cherouse to one year's imprisonment, Chief Kille-Poot-Kin to six months and four Indians to two months each, for cruelly whipping an Indian girl who was caught with her paramour.

About 150 men in the car-building department of the Southern Pacific Shops at Sacramento went out on a strike Tuesday. The trouble grew out of the recent orders that the mechanics in that department be put on piece work. This system prevails in the Eastern shops of the Huntington road.

Died of Lockjaw.

About a week ago James Murphy stepped on a nail in the C. & C. mine and lockjaw was the result. He died yesterday morning in great agony. He was the brother of John Murphy of Steamboat springs.

Gibraltar.

This famous stallion will stand for the season at the ranch of John Sweeney near Carson City. Gibraltar is the sire of Homestake whose record two years ago was 2:14 1/2.

BULLION MONEY.

How Nevada Silver can be Used.

Two years ago there was some talk of resorting to bullion money for use in the silver producing States.

The idea is to have mine owners say to the miners. "We will pay your wages in silver bullion at the rate of 412 grains to the dollar."

If the community accepted the bullion money it could be issued by the various mines in small bars with the stamp of each mine on the bar and the value.

Thus the silver could be run into \$5 or \$10 bars, a five dollar bar to contain 2000 and a ten dollar bar in the same proportion.

These bars would contain more silver than the government is now giving us because the government silver carries alloy.

These bars would be worth only 84 cents on the dollar at the Mint but they would be accepted at par by the community and enable silver miners in the West to resume silver mining operations in spite of Uncle Sam.

It is claimed that the law prevent the coinage of money outside a Mint even if the metal it represents is pure. There are others who claim however that this would be nothing more than bars of silver and not come under the head of money any more than a sack of wheat which a farmer comes in and exchanges for bacon at a grocery store.

Dick Bender Back.

Dick Bender, the intelligent Indian who went to Washington to get relief for the Washoes in this State, returned yesterday with documents countersigned by Congressman Bartine to the effect that Dick and Capt. Jim had a talk with the Commissioners of Indian affairs who acknowledge the justice of the claim and propose to set aside \$1,000 from the Emergency Fund for the immediate relief of the Washoes to be placed in the hands of Mr. Gibson, and as soon as possible ample legislation will be given them.

Dick says Washington is the finest town he ever struck and they had a big time. Everywhere they went about 10,000 boys followed them along the streets and they attracted crowds of people wherever they went. Everybody they met tried to make it pleasant for them.

A Year and a Half.

Mrs. Wiley the mother of ten children was yesterday sentenced by Judge Hawley on a year and a half in the penitentiary, for selling liquor to Indians.

She seemed utterly indifferent to the outcome of the case. While in prison a child will be born to her.
