

GIVE US FAIR BALLOTS.

If the parties managing the new school house deal, insist on having the ballot printed in such a way as to leave the voter no option as between a new school house and repairs, the bonds are liable to be beaten and the children forced to occupy a building badly in need of repairs for some time to come.

It seems to be the policy of the engineers of the scheme to force the voters of the district to put up with the present building indefinitely or saddle themselves with a \$40,000 debt.

An attempt was made at the meeting to allow the voters to have printed on the tickets the words, "For repairs, yes" but it was not even put to a vote. The moment the suggestion was made several parties got up and assured the meeting that if the bonds were voted down the repairs would come.

What right these people had to thus speak for the School Trustees no one knows.

Now in order to give the voters a fair and square show at the proposition let the ballots be printed as follows:

- For bonds. Yes.
- For bonds. No.
- For \$5,000 repairs. Yes.
- For \$5,000 repairs. No.

Now the above has been pronounced as confusing to the voter. If a voter can't pick the proposition he wants out of only four he is not fit to vote at a school election and again how can such a man vote at a general election where he has over a dozen selections to make. If the trustees consider the above ticket too confusing let them have a meeting to decide what they propose doing, and then over their signatures let the public know just what repairs they will make if the bonds are beaten, in order that people who want the school house repaired may not be compelled to vote for bonds when they dislike to do so, because they are whipped into line with the cry, "Bonds or nothing."

THE FIAT HAS GONE FORTH.

Certain distinguished leaders in the Western part of the State have said that there shall be no independent silver action in the State this Fall, and that, they imagine, about settles the whole matter. There is close identification in both parties among many of the leaders in the West. No one has yet contended that independent action should be had unless both National Conventions should completely stifle the voice of silver. We have all hoped that something tangible for silver might be presented without recourse to extraordinary means. But if necessary the people of Nevada, without regard to party, should hold themselves in readiness to take any step that might seem wise to further the local interests of the State. They all do this sort of thing in the East. If you attempt to touch pig iron in Pennsylvania both parties are instantly in arms against you. The very same thing happens if you lay a hand on Massachusetts' woolen or cotton goods. Then why not the West be equally united for silver? Is it a crime for people to stand by their homes? That is what the silver agitation in Nevada means to-day. There will not long be homes for anybody in Nevada if we do not get something done for silver. The question is one of life and death, and under such circumstances a people, like an individual, are justified resorting to any means within their power to preserve their existence. The leaders in the west of Nevada will wake up one of these days to find that they are not leaders at all and nobody follows them. The people of Nevada are tired of having the pace set for them by men who receive their orders from D. O. Mills, the gold bug—Eureka Sentinel.


