

THE PRESS DISPATCHES.

Messrs Thaxter & Coffin have finally attempted to keep their promise to the public and give them full Associate Press Dispatches.

Here is a list of the dispatches taken from the Chronicle of Tuesday and palmed off as Associate Press dispatches in the News.

They were eight dispatches in the News of yesterday morning and four were taken bodily from the Chronicle.

On this showing the News subscribers are asked to double the subscription to the bogus newspaper started by Messrs Thaxter & Coffin to carry out the threat made by them over a year ago when they found they could not put their collar on the APPEAL.

The APPEAL makes no brag and bluster over its dispatches nor does it raise the price of subscription because it publishes them.

We are not giving the readers of the APPEAL a large telegraphic service, we never promised to do so, but the superiority of our dispatches over those published by Messrs Thaxter & Coffin's paper can be readily demonstrated by a comparison of the two.

Both the APPEAL and News telegraphic service rolled into one is still inadequate for the needs of the citizens of Carson and not worth bragging about.

The Tribune hasn't anything to say in last evening's issue about the APPEAL taking dispatches from the Chronicle.

It steals our dispatch of the Leahy murder however without a word of comment.

The only time our twilight contemporary is not accusing someone of stealing is when it is grabbing something itself.

It seems to lack the physical ability to do both things at once.

The most important piece of news published yesterday from Minneapolis was the one from New York regarding the plan of the Harrison men to go over to McKinley to beat Blaine.

Proposals, to be in consideration, must be accompanied by a sufficient bond, with one or more sureties, and by samples or such description of the articles as will clearly designate the kind and quality. Proposals should be addressed to the undersigned and inclosed, with a copy of the advertisement in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Proposals for Supplies." The bids will be opened and registered at the hour named in the presence of bidders and the officers of the Mint.
