

LIGHT AHEAD.

Under this head the Silver State publishes the following:

The writer of this article, who has just returned from the national capital and who while there met all kinds of silver men from the Sherman stripe to the Stewart stamp, believes that the only hope for silver lies with the People's party which meets in national convention in Omaha on July 2d. This party has sprung from the Farmers' Alliance and numbers to-day millions of voters. Their chief principles are the free and unlimited coinage of silver, the government ownership of telegraph lines and the election of United State Senators by the popular vote. If there is anything wrong in such principles we wish someone would arise and explain where it is.

In a personal conversation with some of the party's leaders we were informed that if the silver States would elect delegates to the Omaha convention they would be gladly received and as Jerry Simpson said before the national silver convention, "After you have been humbugged at Minneapolis and fooled at Chicago, march on to Omaha and receive justice at the hands of your friends." Such being the case the Silver State is in favor of the State convention being called not later than the 24th inst. and there elect delegates to the Omaha convention.

A very strong ticket will be nominated without a question, and one that every silver man in the State of Nevada can vote for with a feeling of pride. The present indications are that enough States can be carried to throw the election of President into the House, and there providing the candidates of the People's party are known to be friendly towards the South, so that the southern Representatives can rest assured that with their election they need not fear another Force bill, the chances are more than even that all of the other States would cast their votes in favor of the third party nominees in preference to those of either of the other parties. Chaos reigns in the Republican and Democratic ranks. The independent voters abound.

It is any man's race until it is run, it is no party victory until it is won. The Democratic farmers of the South have found that an overwhelmingly Democratic Congress, elected on loud mouthed professions of retrenchment economy and free coinage, rivals in wild profligacy of expenditure and slavish surrender to the gold trust and combine the fiercely execrated billion dollar gang of Republican bandits and gold-bug sycophants it was chosen to rebuke and cover with eternal shame. The Republican laborers of the north have discovered that in spite of the all-enriching millenium-bringing tariff and honest money they voted to maintain, their wages are steadily declining and they have no money, and all power of strikes are impotent to afford them relief.
