A FRIGHTFUL EXPLOSION.

Thirteen Men Blown to Pieces.

WILL THE PRINTERS WAR ON WHITE LAW REID?

Oakland Train Robbers Reported Caught—The Thermometer Goes to 125 in New York—Gov. Flower's Narrow Escape—Sporting Intelligence from London and Boston.

Explosion at Mare Island.

Vallejo, June 13.—At 11:30 this morning the shell and ammunition magazine at Mare Island exploded. The detonation was so loud that it was like a thunder clap. A dense pillar of smoke rose in the air with the report and pieces of bodies mingled with the debris that fell in the sea and on the adjoining hill sides.

The crowd that rushed to the spot saw a terrible sight. The exploding magazine had strewn the beach with dead and wounded and in the ruins were lifeless and mangled bodies.

There were fifteen men in the place when the explosion took place and twelve were blown to pieces and so severely injured that they are not expected to live. It is supposed that some one dropped a shell and the concussion exploded it and started the rest. Had the big powder magazine exploded it would have seriously damaged Vallejo.

THE CREAMERY.

What the Merchants Think of It.

The merchants of Carson say that the new creameries materially effect the business of Carson. They claim that before the creameries were started that farmers of the adjacent valleys came in here to sell produce and purchase supplies, whereas now they very seldom come to Carson as they sell their milk for cash at their homes instead of converting it into butter to supply the Carson market. More hay is now being used to produce more milk, as the farmers can sell all they get from their herds, and less has consequently come here.

The hay yard people also complain that much of their business has fallen of as ranchers do not come here for the night and the hotels and saloons formulate the same complaint.

It is useless to deny however the fact that Nevada as a State is bound to be benefitted by the sale of Nevada butter to California, Utah and Colorado.

It employs a large number of men and has advanced the price of cattle and placed a large amount of money in circulation. At the start it has effected Carson locally and has shifted the volume of business from one place to another while it has increased the volume. In the near future it is safe to assert that the general benefit to the State will be very material and in the long run Carson will reap its share.
