Ordinance No. 89.

An Ordinance regulating Insurance Licenses.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every Insurance agent transacting business within Carson City shall first obtain and pay for a license equalling one dollar and fifty cents per quarter for each and every company by him represented.

Section 2.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3.—Every person transacting business for any Insurance Company without paying a license herein provided shall be fined not exceeding Fifty dollars or imprisoned in the city jail not to exceed Twenty-five days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

A CINCINNATI WOMAN STARVES HERSELF TO DEATH.

Mrs. Deacon, of Cannes, Turns Up Near San Jose.

A Terrible Accident.

Cincinnati, June 15.—Today there was a terrible accident and loss of life caused by the falling of a bridge in process of construction over the Licking river, between Covington and Newport. The accident was caused by the washing away of the timbers under the bridge, known as false work. There were forty-four workmen on the structure when it fell. Only two escaped. Seventeen bodies have been recovered. Twelve are missing, and more are expected to die tonight. The work of getting out the mangled bodies is very slow. All the houses along the river banks are thrown open to the wounded.

Highbinder's Work.

Colusa June 15.—This morning a Chinawoman named Ah Yum was found murdered in her house. She had been literally butchered with an axe and hacked to pieces. The whole room was smeared with blood. There is no clue to the murderer. It is claimed however, that she was supposed to have revealed some secrets of the Sacramento highbinders who ordered her death.

Starved Herself.

Cincinnati, O., June 15.—Minnie McCocn, aged 23, has starved herself to death. She lived with her parents on West Seventh street, Covington, and died yesterday morning. Her physicians say that the cause of death was exhaustion. A few weeks ago she took a notion that she would quit eating and stoutly refused to touch a mouthful of anything. Physicians attempted to force nourishment into her stomach, but she thwarted every such attempt and grew steadily weaker until she died yesterday.

Mrs. Deacon Turns Up.

San Jose, Cal., June 15.—Mrs. Deacon, the cause of the recent tragedy at Cannes, France, is living in seclusion at the home of her brother near this city.

Was There Collusion?

The Oakland papers are hinting at collusion in the train robbery. Gilson's first account of the robbery was that he tried to stop the train, but was unable to do so.

The conductor tells a very different story, and is corroborated. He says the train remained at the station six minutes after the robbery, to enable anybody who wanted to trace the thieves to do so.

For a minute or more before the train stopped, the thieves were on the rear platform, and Gilson a few feet away with a pistol in hand.

The conductor kept shouting for him to fire, but he declined to do so until the men had left the train, and then he fired several shots.

Eye witnesses say he did not aim at the fugitives, but fired into the ground. He then made a show of chasing them and came back to the train.

Had he meant business he could have traced the buggy some distance and kept it in sight.

The inference is that he was unnerved by fright or in collusion with the thieves.

Our Celebration.

J. Knowlton Jr. Captain of the Veteran Guard was in this city yesterday in conference with the Executive Committee of July Celebration. He says the old guard sixty strong will be here in force accompanied by the Presideo Band of twenty one pieces and a strong delegation of G. A. R. men including officers and privates. The boom is rolling up against the wall of capital already subscribed and when the hour of festivity is at hand the town will break loose in one grand frolic of three days duration. Ten Pullman cars will come through the gates of the city and the people will welcome the guests.

The Insurance Companies.

The new ordinance regarding insurance companies, is the outcome of an agitation on the subject made by Willis Clarke for two years.

Under the old law each agency paid \$10 a quarter irrespective of the companies it represented.

Now each company pays \$1.50 a quarter. Kersey & Yerington represent 36 companies, T. R. Hofer 10, and Willis Clarke 2.

The new method will put nearly \$200 more a year into the treasury.
