Ordinance No. 89.

An Ordinance regulating Insurance Licenses.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every Insurance agent transacting business within Carson City shall first obtain and pay for a license equalling one dollar and fifty cents per quarter for each and every company by him represented.

Section 2.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3.—Every person transacting business for any Insurance Company without paying a license herein provided shall be fined not exceeding Fifty dollars or imprisoned in the city jail not to exceed Twenty-five days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Italians Vowing Vengeance.

Seattle, June 20.—Information now comes from Sedro the scene of the lynching of four Italians last week, that the Italians are 'holding meetings and planning to retaliate. They have vowed to kill every man employed in the lynching and are coming in from the lumber camps. The whites say they will fill the trees with lynched Italians if there is the slightest trouble. The white man killed by them was held on the ground and a crowbar thrust through his body. It was the most brutal murder known in that section for years. If the Italians attempt to make trouble the country will soon be cleared of them, as they are regarded here as worse than the Chinese.

Drowned in a Sewer.

San Francisco, June 20.—This evening a 6-year-old Italian child was playing near a manhole on Union St. which had been left open by workmen, when it fell in and before help could reach it drowned.

Big Grain Fire.

Merced, Cal., June 20.—A grain fire started three miles South of town on P. McNamara's farm. It burned his grain and that of M. Rabely's and H. G. Healey's. The fire is still burning, and seven thousand acres have burned over. Loss \$100,000.

On the Trail.

Livermore Cal., June 20.—Deputy Sheriff Frost of Santa Clara county, has just passed through Livermore. He claims to be close on the trail of the Oakland train robbers, whom he says he has been following for the last forty-eight hours.

New York, June 20.—A cable dispatch from Paris says that Robert Lincoln will be recalled from his position as Minister and asked to succeed Blaine. Depew will be appointed Minister to England.

The Post Office Site.

San Francisco June 20.—The acceptance of the 7th and Mission street site for the new Post Office building has caused considerable comment, as people supposed from the hue and cry made against it by the press that it was doomed.

Men better posted knew perfectly well that it was going through as the war against it was made by the newspapers interested in the Parrott estate site where the St. Ignatious building now stands.

Col. Irish disposed of all the arguments brought against it as soon as they appeared and a good deal of the opposition was against him by newspaper men with whom he had tilts when he edited the Alta.

There was a fee of \$36,000 contingent to be divided up among three newspapers had the present site been rejected. It is generally believed that the Parrott estate was behind the opposition.

Perished in the Desert.

PHENIX, Ari., June 19.—Reports from the Colorado county confirm the information that W. W. Powell and James McClure, two young men just from St. Louis, were lost on the desert southwest of Yuma, and yesterday their bodies were found where they had perished for water.

They started to make the trip from Colton to Yuma and left the trail for some purpose, and losing their way, wandered around in the sand storm of Saturday until death overtook them.

Oakland, June 20.—Fred C. Smith of Alameda, was fatally poisoned by eating soup in a San Francisco restaurant today.


