Ordinance No. 89.

An Ordinance regulating Insurance Licenses.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every Insurance agent transacting business within Carson City shall first obtain and pay for a license equalling one dollar and fifty cents per quarter for each and every company by him represented.

Section 2.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3.—Every person transacting business for any Insurance Company without paying a license herein provided shall be fined not exceeding Fifty dollars or imprisoned in the city jail not to exceed Twenty-five days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

NO FREE COINAGE PLANK IN THE PLATFORM.

A Young Man's Body Found on the Beach.

Chicago June 22.—The fight at the Minneapolis convention is being made over again here.

It is a fight for delay made by the opposition to Cleveland.

The same tactics are being resorted to and they will end the same way. Cleveland will be the choice of the convention and it will be on the first ballot.

The deal made last night, by which Tammany falls into line with the Cleveland men is called a defeat of the tiger, but it is not quite so bad as that. The Tammany tiger never makes a compromise with any faction except on the basis of plenty of good meat for its maw.

The particulars of the deal are only in a state of surmise, but you can rest assured that the tiger will sleep quietly.

The opponents of the Stuffed Prophet are jubilant over having knocked out the obnoxious unit rule.

The Cleveland men gave in without a murmur because they felt they had the game in their hands rule or no rule and this is why they yielded so graciously.

The fight was made to delay the balloting and the Cleveland men gained a point by not fighting.

The trouble over the seats has been adjusted and there is a scene of animation here and great interest.

As prominent men enter the vast hall there is loud cheering.

Flower has been cheered, and Boise received an ovation.

The Committee on Credentials is holding back to aid the anti-Cleveland men and their delay is the subject of much sarcastic comment.

Mills was called on to address the assemblage, but was too ill.

Palmer made a fine address to the convention and pledged Illinois to the Democratic phalanx.

Fellows of New York, was called for but he declined to take the platform.

The Committee on Credentials have finally reported and it favors the seating of the regular Alabama delegates, with the same course taken with Iowa, Utah and Pennsylvania.

Wilson of West Virginia was chosen Permanent Chairman amid a burst of cheers.

A heavy storm then broke over the city about as it did yesterday and for a time it was too dark to ballot if the convention had been ready.

During the time the convention waits for the Platform Committee to report the band is playing and the buzz of conversation in the hall almost drowns the music.

Several prominent Democrats were called on to address the convention but declined and a motion to adjourn until 5, was carried.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

The Silver question is giving the Tammany people a great deal of trouble and will not down.

The Southern and Western men are urging an absolute free coinage plank, holding that such a plank will win the Presidential fight.

They urge that an attempt to conciliate Wall street and New York State will lose the South and West. There will be a majority and a minority report on the silver question, and the minority report will urge free silver.

An anti-Cleveland people are still fighting for time and they made a wild charge when they moved to adjourn.

It was lost and the New York delegation rose and cheered. This means that the Cleveland men know their strength and will force matters to a conclusion.

An attempt was made to wheel Ohio in line solidly for Brice but it failed.

There was considerable excitement when the report of the Platform Committee was presented. Mr. Patterson announced that he had a minority report and would read it. There was a great sensation in the hall and cheering.

CLEVELAND'S NAME.

At the mention of Cleveland's name

there was tremendous applause and cheering for several minutes and a picture of Cleveland was carried around the hall.

The Ohio delegation then brought the Brice banner into the hall and placed it along side of Cleveland's and the excitement and cheering continued for some time.

The debate on the motion to substitute the minority report of the tariff plank resulted in great confusion. It was a lively battle, and at times the rumpus was so great that the roll call was interrupted. The vote stood 564 to 342 in favor of the minority report, the Convention cheering the result.

THE SILVER FIGHT.

Patterson of Colorado took the platform to advocate the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver, the same to be equal and the values interchangeable. He made a splendid defense of the white metal, but his talk was lost upon ears deaf to the voice of reason, and the motion was mowed down with but few votes in its defense.

THE TARIFF PLANK.

The feature of the afternoon session was the debate on the tariff plank.

There was some sharp tilts in the debate in which Watterson and Villas took a leading part.

Villas raised the laugh on Watterson by reading an extract from the Courier Journal in which he praised the plank of 1884 while he was now fighting it. When Villas reached the finance plank there was great excitement. The plank asks for the coinage of gold and silver without discrimination and that both shall be equal in value in the payment of all debts. The platform also expresses sympathy for the Irish people in its fight for home rule, denounces the Force Bill, and the McKinley Bill and urges a revision of the tariff so far as it will not interfere with any domestic industry and promotes reciprocity a humbug and sham.

THE CANDIDATES.

The call of States for the presentation of the names of candidates was announced, and when Gov. Abbott took the platform to present Cleveland's name the place echoed with the thunders of applause, and as it broke forth afresh the Chairman rapped the Convention to order.

HILL'S ROOM.

When Abbott mentioned Hill's name a great roar went up, and when his portrait was carried about the hall the enthusiasm was indescribable. The delegates stood on their chairs and cheered, and the galleries responded in a way that was equal to anything heard at Minneapolis. This tremendous demonstration lasted fully twenty minutes before the excitement calmed down.

Abbott also mentioned Flower and Campbell, and this was the signal for a fresh outbreak, and at the close of his speech the cheering for Cleveland was renewed.

THE ELEMENTS TAKE A HAND.

At this point there was a tremendous clap of thunder and a downpour of rain. For twenty minutes the roll of the artillery of the clouds was heard above the Wigwam and the face was lit with blinding flashes of lightning. After the storm had beat a few moments on the roof, the water began to pour down and flooded the platform.

The deluge was so pronounced that the platform was cleared. The reporters' tables were sloppy with water and one of the San Francisco scribes hoisted up an umbrella amid loud laughter and the band struck up "One more river to cross," amid cheers and laughter.

A motion to clear the galleries if disorder continued was carried, when a voice shouted: "We are the people put us out if you can."

The crowd was almost beside itself with the excitement of the scene enacted before them.

The Hill demonstration showed an unexpected tendency not foreseen by the Cleveland men.

The Hill men are still fighting for delay and if they can force an adjournment it will mean Cleveland's defeat.

For two hours the Convention was the scene of the greatest confusion and wildest excitement. Speakers could not be heard and cheers were mingled with hisses. Numerous efforts were made by the Hill factions to effect an adjournment, but at 2:55 the roll call of States began, and Cleveland was for the third time successively, made the nominee for President of the United States. As was expected he was nominated on the first ballot.

A Body Found.

San Francisco, June 22.—The body of an unknown young man was found on the ocean beach near the Cliff House today with the pockets rifled.

Excitement in San Francisco.

San Francisco, June 22.—There is great excitement here over the Convention news. There is large crowds around all the bulletins and many bets are being made that Cleveland will not be nominated. There is a great crowd in front of the Examiner bulletin on Market street and the place is at times impassible to street cars.

THE CELEBRATION.


