Omaha Convention.

Omaha, June 30.—It is now definitely settled that Gresham will not run, on the grounds that he cannot afford the expense of a campaign. He declined the offer of \$50,000 from the Labor Unions as it would place him in a delicate position. Stewart of Nevada, and Adams of Colorado, are being talked of. It is generally regarded that both Stewart and Jones have bolted the Republican ticket and will stump the country for the third party nominee.

The Prohibitionists.

Cincinnati O., June 30.—The financial plank of majority of platform committee of Prohibition Convention stands, but the plank for free coinage of silver was beaten by a large vote. Other planks urge laws for the suppression of liquor traffic, demand woman suffrage and equal pay regardless of sex. They also demand government control of railroads, telegraph and other public corporations, further restriction to immigration and extension of naturalization period.

McAuliffe a Tapioca.

San Francisco, June 30.—The fight this evening between Goddard and McAuliffe, fought at the Wigwam disposal of Joe McAuliffe as a pugilist. Goddard won in 15 rounds and had the fight from the start. He opened with an aggressive battle and pushed his man all through forcing the work and administering terrible punishment. McAuliffe made a game struggle, but his leads were too slow and he was unable to land effectually. McAuliffe's face was battered almost to a jelly and when he went down for the last time he was a wreck.

A Bridegroom Killed.

San Antonio, Tex., June 30.—News reached here today from Alpine, a small town on the line of the Southern Pacific, that on Monday last Jordan Bennett was shot and killed by John Gord, the rejected suitor of the girl Bennett had just married. There is talk of lynching.

Texas Vengeance.

Denton, Tex., June 30.—E. W. Harris, edito. of the Greenville Herald, while driving with his brother yesterday, met Dr. Y. K. Yowell, late of Greenville, on the road with Detective D. H. Davis. On seeing the Harris brothers Dr. Yowell fired at them twice and then ran. E. W. Harris took a careful sight along the barrel of his Winchester at the flying figure and shot Yowell dead with a bullet through the heart. It is alleged that Yowell was ruining Harris' home.

The British Lion Roars.

St. John's, N. F. June 30.—The lobster factory of James Houlihan, at Derby Head Cove, Bonn bay, on the coast, has been raided by the British warship Buzard. The hoiler and boats were removed and the woodpile burned. The warship then suddenly left.

The lobster business at that point is now destroyed.

A disastrous forest fire is now raging in the districts about Renew and Bay Bulls. Two families at the former place have been rendered homeless by the fire.

Killed by Hogs.

St. Mary's O., June 30.—Clerk Stewart, aged 92, the oldest resident in Miami county, was attacked yesterday by hogs while walking through the barn yard, and killed. When help reached him the hogs were still eating his body.

A LYING STATEMENT.

A Slander on the Creamery Refuted.

In Wednesday's Examiner there appeared in the telegraphic columns a dispatch from Virginia City relative to the creameries in this State.

The dispatch stated that the creameries were being run on oleomargarine, and that most of the products from which the butter was made by these creameries was procured at Low Drexler's oleomargarine factory in San Francisco.

The article also stated that since the creameries were established the soap factories of Nevada found it hard work to secure sufficient raw material to run on.

Knowing the charges made in the article to be manufactured from whole cloth, an APPEAL reporter called on Governor Colcord, Vice President of the Company and Acting Manager, and offered its columns for a statement. The Governor said:

"I cannot understand why a newspaper should publish such an article. I would not even make a denial or explanation did we only furnish the home market, but as our product goes all over the Coast, it may be advisable to make a statement.

"The charges are absolutely false. We never yet delivered an ounce of butter from our creameries that was not made from absolutely pure cream and I am authorized to say that our Company will pay \$1000 for any chemical analysis from a reputable chemist, showing that our butter contains anything else than the product of pure milk.

"Our butter is on sale at many of the leading houses in San Francisco and we invite the Examiner people or anyone else to take samples of the butter and have it analyzed by competent chemists and the company will pay the expenses of analysis.

"We think the best proof of its purity is the fact that we have never yet lost a customer and our present customers are calling for more. We have recently closed a contract with the Bohemian Club and Palace Hotel of San Francisco, to furnish them our butter for one year.

"With our present facilities we are unable to supply the demand for our butter. We are now purchasing from the farmers 31,000 pounds of milk daily and are arranging to largely increase our facilities with additional creameries, now in course of construction.

"Under ordinary circumstances I would not consider it necessary for a business man to advocate his own honesty. I will say however in this connection, that the President of the company, who has been the most ardent promoter of this enterprise, has an enemy in Virginia City who is endeavoring to injure him by the circulation of false and malicious reports, which if believed might seriously affect the business of over three hundred farmers in this State, as well as a large number of shareholders in this company, but as these accusations are made by innuendo only, it would appear to be rather a difficult matter for us to defend ourselves in the Courts.

The dispatch speaks of recent tests having been made of this butter which showed oleomargarine. We do not believe such tests were ever made and we challenge their production and the names of the parties making them. The charge that we purchase our material of Low Drexler (meaning probably Drexler) is false, we never had a dollars worth of business with Mr. Drexler or Drexler and challenge the proof.

The charge that Nevada soap factories are closing up because of the creameries is too ridiculous to merit reply. During the present month we purchased of the farmers in Carson and Mason Valleys about \$7,300 worth of milk and our books are open to the inspection of any one who cares to see them.

"In my opinion the whole animus of the attack is to satisfy a grudge against Mr. Williams on account of the recent mining suit.

Francis Freeman of Salt Lake, Geo. L. Hicks of New York, and Frank Harris of London, are in this city for the purpose of filing incorporation papers for the Utah, Nevada & California R. R., to reach from Salt Lake to Los Angeles. The road will pass through Nye and Lincoln Counties in this State. Hon. William Woodburn is the attorney for the incorporators.

Ordinance No. 89.

An Ordinance regulating Insurance Licenses.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every Insurance agent transacting business within Carson City shall first obtain and pay for a license equalling one dollar and fifty cents per quarter for each and every company by him represented.

Section 2.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3.—Every person transacting business for any Insurance Company without paying a license herein provided shall be fined not exceeding Fifty dollars or imprisoned in the city jail not to exceed Twenty-five days or by both such fine and imprisonment.


