A FRIGHTFUL EXPLOSION.

Seven Million Fire at St. Johns.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND PEOPLE HOMELESS.

The Governor Refuses to Send Troops to Homestead.

Special to the APPEAL:

Frightful Explosion at Berkley.

San Francisco, July 9th.—At about 9:25 this morning there was an explosion at the giant powder works near West Berkley, which was at once followed by several others, completely wrecking the various buildings and causing at least half a million damage and killing a number of people.

The explosion is said to have been caused by the overturning of a bottle of acid which set fire to the building.

The force of the concussion was felt in Oakland, and had all the effects of a shock of earthquake, breaking windows and damaging property.

In fact the shock was felt all over Alameda county, and the damage done is considerable from this cause.

When the cause of the shock became known there followed scenes of the wildest confusion. Every vehicle in the city was pressed into the service to reach the spot, and the street cars and railroad trains were at once packed with people.

When the spot was reached, a scene was presented which caused the strongest heart to faint.

The side of the hill is strewn with the wreckage of the powder houses and magazines, and mangled arms and legs are seen here and there.

The space about the scene is black with people and the authorities have difficulty in keeping them back.

The big magazine with 300 tons of powder is on fire, and no one dare approach it, as it is liable to explode at any moment.

There are 185 men employed in the works, and so far not one has been found.

When the crowd realized the terrible danger which might result in the explosion of the magazine, it withdrew, and now the circle of people at least a mile away, watching to see the explosion, which will be the most terrible of the series.

Physicians and surgeons are coming in from all directions.

It is claimed that over twenty Chinamen are buried in the ruins and in one place. Attempts have been made to call the roll of the employes, but the roll book is said to be lost.

The Southern Pacific sent a rescue train to the spot carrying physicians and surgeons. Nearly all the employes of the works are Chinese and over one hundred are supposed to be killed.

A Seven Million Fire.

St. Johns, New Brunswick, July 9.—A fire broke out here this morning with a heavy wind blowing, and spread so rapidly that it passed beyond the control of the firemen. The flames ate their way through the city with such rapidity that people had to flee for their lives.

The firemen were obliged to leave their engines to the mercy of the flames. At least two thirds of the city is burned over and fifteen thousand people are homeless and camped on the suburbs of the city gazing on the blackened ruins of their homes. Thieves are plundering right and left. Men in the street, frenzied with drink and excitement are fighting the police, who are working hard to preserve order. About 700 houses were burned and nearly twenty people perished. The loss is estimated at from seven to ten millions.

No Troops for Pittsburg.

Pittsburg, July 9.—Everything has quieted down but the works are still watched by the strikers. The news that the Governor refused to send troops was received with cheers by the strikers.

Field Dying.

New York July 8.—Cyrus W. Field awoke delirious yesterday. He wanted to get out of bed, ordered his clothing packed so that he might go to Europe in the interest of the Atlantic cables and became very much excited when the nurse tried to quiet him. Messengers were sent out for Dr. Coutant. By 10 o'clock almost everybody in Dobbs Ferry and vicinity believed that Field was dead.

He was put to sleep with an opiate and remained unconscious for some

hours. When he awoke he was slightly delirious and there was no medicine in the house. Mrs. Dudley Field, his brother-in-law's daughter-in-law, went to the village to get a fresh supply and he was speedily quieted after her return. In the evening he slept quietly. Nothing more definite can be said about his condition than has been reported every day since last Saturday. He may die at any moment, he may survive for two or three days.

An English Opinion.

London, July 9.—The daily Chronicle, the newspaper champion of labor, describes the Pinkerton men who went to Homestead as "armed cutthroats and hired ruffians." "The men killed," says the Chronicle, "were foully murdered in a State now controlled by the most unprincipled-managed combination in the civilized world. Such were the means employed by a great syndicate, whose head is the author of the trashy platitudes entitled, 'Triumphant Democracy.' All the facts point to the unscrupulous greed and tyrannical power of wealth in America being the chief source of the trouble."

For Seven Years.

San Francisco, July 9.—Martin J. Handley, convicted of arson, has been sent to San Quentin for seven years.


