A California Murderer Gets Seven Years.

PACIFIC MAIL MUST SHIP WHITE SAILORS.

Knight Templars Arrive in San Francisco.

Mrs. Harrison's Health.
New York, July 30.—The Mail and Express' Loon Lake, N. Y., special says: A telegram has been received from the President that on account of the non-adjournment of Congress he will be unable to come to Loon Lake until the first of the coming week. Mrs. Harrison's health is now so much improved she is not to be considered an invalid. For the present, however, she will continue here quietly resting and gaining strength, in order that she may return to Washington fully invigorated.

Anti-Chinese Victory.
San Francisco, July 30.—Collector Phelps this afternoon received a telegram from the Secretary of the Treasury stating that the Pacific Mail Steamship Company cannot ship the Chinese the Company desired to transfer from the City of Peking to the new steamer Peru. The Secretary adds that the Chinese will have to be deported at the expense of the Company. This is a distinct victory for the Sailors' Union. It was contended that should the Chinese crew be shipped here, they would be entitled to land upon their return. The Company will now have to ship white crews.

Two Men Killed.
Somerset, Ky., July 30.—A desperate fight occurred at Flat Rock yesterday afternoon between Deputy Sheriff Sellers and Coffey, in which both were killed. Coffey had been found guilty of adultery and fined \$30 for adultery. When Sellers went to serve the capias, Coffey shot him in the breast. Sellers then drew and shot Coffey four times. Then both fell and died in a few minutes. Both were married and of middle age.

From Pulpit to Sulkey.
Fort Dodge, Ia., July 30.—Rev. Mr. Tyrell, the Methodist preacher who offered to whip a man for doubting the accuracy of his timing on a horse race, has handed in his resignation to the presiding elders. It was promptly accepted. Mr. Tyrell announces his intention of going into the business of horseracing.

Got Seven Years.
San Jose, July 30.—Special officer Kilvington who shot and killed Henry Schmidt, a citizen whom the officer commanded while Schmidt was running alongside the walk at night, was this afternoon sentenced to seven years imprisonment.

Knight Templars En Route.
San Francisco, July 30.—Ninety-five Knight Templars of Philadelphia members of the Denver Club of 1892 who are on their way to the Conclave at Denver arrived in the city this afternoon.

Republicans in Council.
Yesterday afternoon the Republican State Central Committee met at Virginia City in the International Hotel. There were 32 members in attendance, and the following business was transacted:

It was decided to hold the primaries on Saturday, August 20. The test adopted for the primaries is: "I am a Republican and in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver on equal terms with gold, at the rate of 16 to 1."

It was decided to hold the State Convention at Reno on August 21, for the purpose of nominating three Presidential electors, a member of Congress, Judge of the Supreme Court, members of the Board of Regents and appointing a State Central Committee.

The apportionment of delegates is as follows: Churchill 2, Douglas 5, Elko 14, Esmeralda 10, Eureka 10, Humboldt 6, Lander 6, Lincoln 5, Lyon 7, Nye 3, Ormsby 12, Storey 30, Washoe 18, White Pine 6. Total 134.

A. MORRIS--SCIENTIST.

He Makes an Important Discovery Regarding Salivation.

Arthur Morris, alias Baron Munchausen, has been making a close study of the food question for the past two years, and in the last month has made a specialty of Carson river trout. Mr. Morris is quite conservative in scattering the fruit of his research, but in a private conversation with an APPEAL reporter recently he discussed the salivation question at length.

He is such a close and careful student of nature in all its branches, that this journal does not hesitate to quote him as follows:
"Yes, it is one of the most important discoveries of this rapidly advancing age, and I am quite positive that in a few days I will have so practically demonstrated the truth of what at present you might term a theory, that no more trout will be eaten by people on the Carson river below the Mexican mill. At that point the slum and refuse from the stumps flows into the river after passing through a system of quicksilver pans.

"Now, it is a well known fact that more or less of this Mugwump fluid is bound to escape with the debris, and would in a measure charge the river bed, mixing in with fish food of all descriptions.

"Now, when a fish weighing two pounds comes down the stream feeding along the bottom, and strikes the quicksilver deposits, its weight commences to go up at the rate of an ounce a day, and by the time the fish arrives at the Brunswick mill it tips the scale at three and a half or four pounds.

"It always makes a man feel good to land a fish at this point, because it weighs so much.

"Why, I saw a fish eight inches long taken out at the Brunswick and it weighed three pounds. Of late a number of millmen have been salivated, and without any apparent cause.

"This created some surprise in my mind, so I caught several from an Indian, and after dressing them carefully, fed them to a well known dog, and waited for results. In three days the animal commenced to do some acrobatic work in front of Andy Todd's, and every time the wind toyed with his hair it yanked about a foot of it into the grasp of the playful breeze. Inside of a week he was bald all over and his teeth rattled like two Pullman car strawberries in a dry short cake. The poor brute now languishes, a martyr to scientific research, in Jerry Barret's barn.

"Now this proves beyond a doubt that the trout are equally unhealthy for human beings to eat and I would suggest that anglers make no more hauls below the Mexican mill.

"Is this as far as your investigations go Mr. Morris," enquired the exhausted quill driver.

"No sir, not by any means; I will soon give Fish Commissioner Mills some data and facts about the "salmo mykiss henshawii" (quicksilver trout) that will give him a very severe pain in the forehead."

"Will not such a condition sooner or later result in a river full of salivated fish?"

"No at all. You must remember that after passing over the quicksilver deposits they become too heavy to swim back against the current and I readily endorse all trout caught above Empire."

GENERAL WEAVER AT DENVER.
Presented With a Silver Pen With Which to Sign a Free Coinage Bill.
The silver campaign was opened at Denver last Wednesday evening by General James B. Weaver. He was greeted by the largest and most enthusiastic assemblage of people ever convened in the city to listen to an orator. He spoke for two hours and twenty minutes in an argument for free coinage which set the vast audience wild with enthusiasm. At the conclusion of his speech B. Clark Wheeler, of Aspen, presented him with a silver pen with which to sign a free coinage bill as the President of the United States. At this juncture the whole assembly rose and shouted itself hoarse, the two brass bands struck up "Hail to the Chief," the cannot fire a salute. The General stood during the tumult, bowing and smiling and when he could be heard he said in a quiet manner in a clear, ringing voice, "It will be the greatest pleasure of my life to sign a free coinage bill and thus bring relief to the whole country and infuse life into every industry."

The Woolly Aphis of the Apple.

The Nevada Agricultural Experiment Station is about to issue its bulletin No. 17 which treats in popular language of the woolly lice which infest the bark and roots of the apple tree.

This is a seasonable bulletin inasmuch that it appears at a time when the insects are abundant, and in consequence when there is a general demand for information regarding them. The bulletin is not lengthy, contains several illustrations representing the pests and some of their insect enemies, and enumerates remedies, which, if properly applied, will serve to keep the insects within seriously injurious numbers.

The aim of the bulletin is to explain the nature of the insects and such remedies as will control them with little expense.

The woolly aphis are provided with slender sucking beaks with which they pierce the tenderest bark of the tree and withdraw the nourishing sap from those parts which need it most. In limited numbers these lice could do little or no harm, but when they appear in countless myriads, the truth of their being "strength in numbers" soon becomes apparent. Young grafts, new growths of stems and leaves suffer most perhaps, from the bark form of the aphis. Those infesting the roots cause knotty swellings to appear upon them.

The sap drawn from the roots causes the tree to become sickly and finally die without apparent cause. This has been termed the American Blight.

The attack upon the roots is the most injurious to the tree, as it is apt to become far advanced before the nature of the disease is known, and because the application of remedies is more difficult in cases of this form than it that those affecting the bark.

For these reasons preventive measures against the root form of the woolly aphis become most effectual when the form affecting the bark are kept so reduced as to prevent their spreading to the roots.

Remedies for the bark form are found in the use of kerosene emulsion, tobacco decoction and carbolic soap suds.

The best remedy for the root form is "bisulphide of carbon, the fumes of which penetrate the soil about the roots and kill the insects with which they come in contact.

I am firmly convinced that the rule as reported by the committee on rules will not bring us to a vote, and for that reason I shall try to vote down the previous question and adopt a cloture rule. That is all I desire to say, and I yield back the remainder of the time to the gentleman from Missouri.—Bartine's speech in Congress, July 14.
