Fraudulent Mind Readers Skip the Town—Painful Injury.

A Dastardly Deed.

New Orleans, La. August 2.—News has been received of a dastardly outrage in St. Maray's parish. Fifteen armed white men visited the cabin of Jean Gabriel, a negro who works on shares on Pierre Lassalle's plantation, and gave him an unmerciful beating. They next flogged his wife and daughter, and ordered the entire family to leave the parish. The negro recognized five of the party, and, going to St. Martinsville, made affidavits against them. These men were arrested and placed under \$500 bonds each.

The negro's face and body gave evidence of the terrible treatment he had received. When asked the occasion of the whipping he stated that several days previous he had refused to swap a fine young horse for one decidedly inferior and believes that this refusal led to the outrage, as the man who wished to swap was in the party.

Bribery and Corruption.

London, Aug. 2.—A petition has been presented against the return of Right Honorable James Balfour, First Lord of Treasury and Conservative leader in the House of Commons, a member of Parliament for East Manchester, on the ground that his election was obtained by bribery and illegal voting, and by the wholesale trading of voters and hiring of vehicles to carry them to the polls. Balfour was declared elected by 5147 votes to 4749 for Professor K. F. C. Murre, Liberal.

A Long Walk.

Wilmington, Del., August 2.—Zoe Cayton, the celebrated woman long-distance walker, reached this city at 5:30 yesterday afternoon, accompanied by two companions, William Marshall and J. L. Price, and her cocker spaniel "Beauty." She is on her way from New York to San Francisco via New Orleans. She must cover the distance of 3861 miles in 137 days or lose a wager of \$20,000. She resumed her march at 10:15 this morning.

Wanted His Money.

San Francisco, August 2.—Until lately William D. Sigler was employed in the Comstock mines. A few days ago he came to this city. Yesterday he visited the office of Alvinza Hayward and demanded \$150,000. The man is evidently insane, and was arrested by Detective Coffey and taken to the Home of the Inebriates, pending examination before the Commissioners of Lunacy.

Weaver at Ogden.

Ogden, August 2.—Gen. Weaver arrived here this afternoon and was welcomed by an immense concourse of people. It was an ovation seldom if ever witnessed in this city. He will speak this evening and leave for Nevada on the midnight train.

Levitating Frauds—Injured by Machinery.

San Francisco, August 2.—Charles N. and Martha Steen, mind readers and exponents of spiritualism, left suddenly for Australia this morning aboard the bark Albert, leaving mourning creditors.

J. Ellsworth was terribly hurt by being drawn into the machinery at an Oakland flour mill today. One arm was almost torn off.

New York, August 2.—The American District messenger boys struck this morning.

A Leg Broken.

A man named Munroe, stepped into a sewer ditch last night back at the Excelsior House, and broke the ankle bone of his left leg.

His cries finally brought assistance and he was taken to the Ormsby House on a stretcher. Dr. Lee was summoned, and it was found that the bone had broken through the flesh, necessitating the taking of several stitches after the fracture was set. During the operation, the man smoked his pipe nonchalantly, and stood the pain without a murmur.

SAM WRIGHT'S FUNERAL.

His Remains taken to Sacramento.

Yesterday afternoon the remains of Hon. Sam C. Wright lay cofined in the front parlor of his residence, where they were visited by hundreds of people.

The coffin had been specially selected by his life long friend Capt. Cowan and was what is known as the Westminster copper casket, the most finished burial casket known to the undertakers profession. King Kalakaua was buried in its exact counterpart.

The remains were exposed at full length under a single sheet of French plate glass. The deceased looked as if he had merely fallen asleep and there was an expression of perfect calm on his features.

The Carson Guards had a uniformed soldier at the head and foot of the coffin all day, and the floral tributes were seen on every side, the last mementoes of his friends.

The services at the house under the auspices of the Lodge were conducted by the Worshipful Master M. D. Noteware assisted by the Chaplain Geo. R. Davis.

After the services the procession moved down the street headed by the Carson Guard. The Masonic Lodge of this city marched on foot in regalia.

The following were the pall bearers:

Judge Murphy, John Wagner, P. B. Ellis, E. D. Catts, Treunor Coffin, T. D. Edwards, D. D. Dobbs and J. O'Hare.

The Masons represented the De Witt Clinton Commandary of Virginia City, and the last two named represented the Carson Guard.

An escort of Masons accompanied his remains to Sacramento where the funeral takes place today.

A large concourse of people gathered at the train to see the body placed upon the cars and the city of Carson bade a last adieu to one of its staunchest pioneers.

Nailed the Costs.

A few days ago James Furlong, a miner and woodchopper, was arrested by Constable Patterson on the charge of drunkenness. He was fined \$5 and costs by Justice Hawthorne, the costs being \$17.25.

He said he was ready to work out his fine, but the Justice said no, and garnished \$20 he had on deposit with Johnny Meyer at the Sacramento Saloon.

The man protested that it would leave him almost penniless, and that he was willing to work it out. He was not allowed to do so, however, and the Court swooped down on his money. Being out of money he is liable to be arrested as a vagrant almost any time.

Garnishing money on deposit to secure costs and fines is a new thing in this county.

Attempted Robbery.

Yesterday afternoon J. S. Kinkead Supt. of the Occidental Mill, was taking \$10,000 over the grade from Gold Hill to the mill, when he was accosted by a man with a sixshooter who demanded the money. Kinkead replied by blazing away with a shotgun, and the man throwing away his pepper box, gave up the fight, with several buckshot in his arm.

He was ordered to get in the buggy and come to town, where he was turned over to the authorities. He proved to be Wm. Hurd an employee of the mine. He had his face blacked, and laid the whole matter to drink.

A Wretched Case.

The Reno Gazette denounces in deserved terms the act of a Bodie mining Superintendent who seduced a Virginia girl three years ago under promise of marriage and now refuses to marry her or support her child. Lynching would be a mild form of punishment for such an infamous crime. The Gazette thinks he ought to be tabooed.
