CAN BE RECOVERED.

The Pertinent Inquiry of a Taxpayer.

ED. APPEAL.—I understand that there is no way in which money can be recovered by the county after it is illegally paid out by the County Commissioners.

No, it is not. The law provides that any citizen can begin suit to recover money illegally paid out, and on his failing to do so it shall be the duty of the District Attorney to begin the suit.

If the money cannot be recovered from the citizen to whom it has been illegally paid, it can be recovered from such Commissioners as voted for the allowance.

The law has thrown plenty of safeguards about the county treasury, and if the law is observed boodlism will not flourish.

Every county officer on going into office should read all the laws that appertain to his office, and also keep track of every new one passed by the Legislature.

It is also important that after reading them he should observe them.

The APPEAL'S Charges Sustained Against Commissioner Bray.

Parkinson or Doane Suppressed the Publication of Bray's Bills, BUT NEITHER KNEW HOW IT ALL HAPPENED.

All the Rest Exonerated and the Whitewash Bucket Exhausted.

To the Hon. Richard Rising, Judge of the First Judicial District, State of Nevada, at Carson City, Nev., August 3, 1892:

SIR:—In accordance with instructions received from your honor, the Grand Jury has, to the best of its ability, endeavored to carry out those instructions, by making a thorough investigation into the affairs of the county of Ormsby and the acts of the various county officers during the past four years.

The Jury has given attention to all charges made by the MORNING APPEAL, and by citizens who have asked the privilege of appearing before the Grand Jury; and furthermore we have invited all citizens who could give the Grand Jury any information that would show malfeasance in office by any county officer to appear before the Jury and do so, which invitation has been taken advantage of generally.

The Grand Jury has, as far as in its power to do, examined into every detail of county affairs, as well as into all charges made, both in public and privately before the Grand Jury, and has left no stone unturned or overlooked any charge, no matter how small, without a thorough investigation, satisfactory to every member of the Grand Jury.

CHARGES AGAINST COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Charges against the Commissioners in regard to the letting of contracts for county printing and advertising:

Upon examination of the bids and testimony of expert printers not interested, we find that the action of the Commissioners was legal and for the best interests of the county. The APPEAL bid, while one dollar lower, excepted bound work, pile work, and all advertising more than three squares, while the other papers excepted bound work only.

CHARGES AGAINST COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

It was unanimously agreed by this Grand Jury that Henry Martin, County Commissioner, be exonerated from the charge of being or having been directly or indirectly interested in any county contracts of any nature whatever.

In regard to charges against County Commissioner Bray, we have investigated fully all such charges, have taken the opinion of District Attorney, and also attorneys Woodburn and J. R. Judge. It is the unanimous opinion of this Jury that all work done for the county by Mr. Bray, has been well done and his charges were reasonable, but we are of the opinion, from such legal advice which we have received in regard to the law, that a County Commissioner has not the legal right to perform any road or bridge work except in cases of urgent necessity.

With the above exception we have found all acts of the County Commissioners legal and for the best interests of the county.

This Grand Jury finds that the bills of Charles E. Bray against the county for hauling and road work, were wholly omitted for the period of one year, in the Tribune's published list of bills against the county.

It is the duty of the County Clerk to furnish the newspaper with a transcript of all bills for publication.

County Clerk Doane and E. J. Parkinson testified that they could not account for the omission.

This Grand Jury considers this gross negligence on the part of some one, but upon whom this Grand Jury cannot say. We suggest to the county Commissioners that this duty be hereafter attended to.

We have examined the books of the County Clerk and County Auditor and find all bills have been properly allowed and audited.

Dr. Guinan appeared before this Grand Jury two different times in reference to the manner in which the County Physician is employed. In view of the fact that the Court instructed the Grand Jury that said matter did not properly come under our jurisdiction, the jury decided to take no action in the matter.

After a thorough investigation, we

have failed to find where any County officer has accepted a commission or any compensation whatever on account of any county contracts.

This Grand Jury recommended to the sheriff that he investigate the reported Lotteries in Chinatown and to suppress the same if they exist.

The above report is respectfully submitted to the Court.

THE CAPITAL WALK.

The Contractors Make an Excellent Job of It.

The concrete walk around the Capitol is now completed as far as the last legislative appropriation will allow. It runs all along Main street on the West side, one hundred feet on the North side and all along the South side.

Although it contains more than twice as much square feet as the Post Office walk it did not cost as much.

It was laid by George Goodman of San Francisco the leading maker of artificial stone on the Coast, who laid the walk at the Palo Alto University and whose work will stand for all time.

His walks are laid under the Schillinger patent and consist of mixing one part of Portland cement with six parts of sand in a semi fluid state and then fixing it before it hardens. While it is in this condition small groves are made in the mass which gives it the appearance of large square stones laid symmetrically. These groves serve another purpose besides ornament. If a heavy pressure should crack the rock, the cracks do not extend beyond the groves. After the mass crystallizes the walk is a solid piece of rock and will last for a hundred years. The cement comes from the Portland cement mines in England. No other cement in the world crystallizes as well or can be worked to such advantage. The new walk is the delight of the wheelmen. The next legislature will probably appropriate enough money to complete the walk all around the Capitol square.

There was 9875 square feet of walk and 462 linear feet of gutter with 420 feet of stone curbing. The price was \$2471.


