MURDERED BY HIS WIFE.

She Died from Eating Toadstools.

MORE OF THE FRESNO TRAIN ROBBERY.

Painful Death of One of the Victims.

A Strange Murder.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 6—Berkeley, a suburban town of Norfolk, was startled yesterday over the murder of James A. Brook, a well known young business man. About 2 o'clock this morning men passing the Brock residence heard the cry of "Help!" and on entering they found the young man lying on his back in bed, with a bullet hole in the back of his head. A revolver with the muzzle pointed toward him lay alongside.

Mrs. Brock said that her husband had accidentally shot himself. Her conduct the day before, however, caused suspicion to rest upon her and she was placed under arrest. Yesterday afternoon a jury at the inquest accused her of murder. Brook was her second husband and was 24 years old while she is 49. Her first husband was named Pritchard. She was divorced from him about two years ago in North Carolina. Brook was a prosperous young merchant and a good citizen. No cause can be assigned for the murder.

A Brutal Outrage.

London, Aug. 6—Further details of the outrage committed near Chislehurst Wednesday evening upon Miss Woods, a niece of Chancellor of the Exchequer Goschen, and her companion, show that both Miss Woods and her friend, a young lady named Philbrick, were dangerously injured; the former by being shot in the face with a carbine loaded with slugs and the latter by being struck on the head with the butt of a carbine.

Both were rendered unconscious and for some time lay in the road where they had fallen.

Miss Woods was the first to recover consciousness. After a short time spent in vain endeavors to revive her companion, she with great difficulty crawled along the road to the nearest cottage and gave the alarm.

A party was immediately formed to search for the girl's assailants.

A man named Manklow was arrested but protested his innocence. Miss Wood identified him as their assailant. Her companion Miss Philbrick, is in a critical condition.

Death in Toadstools.

Kent, O., Aug. 6—May, the fifteen-year-old daughter of Byron Stillwell, made a mistake yesterday which cost her her life. The girl's parents live near Brimfield, in the lower part of the county. She went out to gather huckleberries and saw something she mistook for mushrooms. They turned out to be toadstools. In about an hour after eating them she was taken sick and hurried home. A physician was sent for, but she was dead before he arrived.

Died of His Wounds.

Visalia, Aug. 6—Oscar Beaver who was shot by the train robbers, Evans and Sontag, at an early hour this morning, died at 3 o'clock this afternoon in great agony. The robbers have reached the mountain range, but the posse is in close pursuit. Deputy Sheriff Witty will recover if blood poisoning does not occur.

Drowned While Bathing.

Davenport, Ia., August 6—Three young women—Nellie Zollinger, Blanche Simonson and Grace Maxwell—were drowned while bathing in the Mississippi river yesterday at Port Byron. The first two got beyond their depth and sank. Miss Maxwell lost her life in trying to save them.

For the Ladies.

San Francisco, August 6—The sealing schooner Sophia Sutherland has arrived in port from Japan waters, the first of the sealers to arrive from the other side. She brought 1603 seal skins as a result of the season's catch.

Smith Grabs the Road.

Santa Cruz, August 6—The controlling interest in the Pacific Avenue street railway has been sold to J. Phillip Smith, capitalist. The price

has not been made public. The line will be made an electric one.


