Colorado's Wild Man.
Sterling, Colo., Aug. 8.—For the past few weeks the stockmen living along the Oeder and among the canons to the northwest of this place, have been annoyed by the loss of several fine calves. The work did not appear to be that of gray wolves, which are numerous in this section so a party of twenty stockmen set out, well mounted and armed, to hunt down this lover of veal.

After several hours of hard riding over a rugged country they came upon the object of their search. It was a human being in the person of a man of middle age, with face covered with a long beard. On seeing creatures of his own kind he fled with the seeming fright and swiftness of a wild animal. They pursued, but to no purpose. After running some distance he seemed to dissolve into the very rocks and all manner of diligence could not reveal his hiding place.

He has been seen by several different parties since, but none have been able to get near him. His lair was discovered in a rocky gorge, where the bones of animals were profusely scattered about. It is the opinion of some that this strange creature is a madman.

LAST NIGHT'S RUNAWAY.

Three Ladies Thrown Out but no One Injured.

Last evening about 6:30 Mrs. C. W. Friend accompanied by her daughter Laura drove to the residence of A. Livingston to take Miss Judell riding. When the young lady had comfortably seated herself the horse bounded forward without any apparent cause and turned the down street leading to the Armory.

Miss Laura being the only occupant left tried to recover the reins but before she could do so she was pitched out striking on the head and shoulders, bruising her face and arms.

Willing hands assisted the frightened ladies to their feet and Mrs. Friend and her daughter were taken into the residence of Mrs. Wylie and their injuries were found to be very slight.

Miss Judell was taken home by Mr. Livingston and remarked as she was picked up: "I know I'm not hurt but I am frightened."

The whole thing was extremely fortunate in the end and the ladies are happy to admit it.
