DEATH AND DISASTER ON THE JAPAN COAST.

Shooting Scrapes Increasing--Creation in Ohio--A Missing Capitalist--Carver Wants an Advertisement.

San Francisco Aug 11.—The steamer Rio Jenero arrived tonight from China and Japan and among the passengers was Georgia Cavan and a party of actresses who have been touring Japan.

The American ship North American wrecked off the Japan coast and succeeded in saving all hands. Fifty passengers on the native steamer Inagawa maru went down with the wreck in the inland sea.

A war is reported to have broken out in Formosa between the Chinese and aborigines.

A whirlwind in the northern part of Hataragun, Japan killed two people, injured 40 and destroyed over 50 houses.

Three Cheers for Judge Gresham.

St. Louis Aug. 11.—There is a great exultation at the People's Party headquarters today over the receipt of a telegram and letter from the Chairman of the Indiana State Committee, alleging that Judge Walter Q. Gresham has promised to take the stump this Fall in the interests of the People's Party. Chairman Taubeneck was asked to give out the letter, but refused to do so.

A Missing Capitalist.

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—Judge Henry Schefer the discoverer of the new bonanza mines has been missing for ten days and his friends fear foul play. He left here for Reno and intended going to Utah but has not been heard from since leaving San Francisco. He left \$150,000 in the bank here.

A Servant Girl Stabbed.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Louise Isle, a servant in the house of Christian Jackman, was stabbed to death tonight by Joseph Jackman, son of her employer. Bad blood has existed between the two for some time and the tragedy was the immediate result of a scene the woman made in the sick room of Jackman's father.

Carver Makes a Fool of Himself.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 11.—The famous Dr. W. F. Carver of the Wild West show has caused quite a flutter of excitement by issuing a challenge to the editor of the Republican to meet him and give him satisfaction on account of an article appearing in that paper criticizing the doctor's show.

The Carnegie Boycott.

Homestead, Aug. 11.—President Gompers, and other labor leaders are expected to perfect plans for a general boycott on all the material manufactured by the Carnegie Co. The strikers are jubilant over the signing of the scale by outside manufacturers.

Dangerously Wounded.

Sacramento, Aug 11.—Information has been received that J. W. Butler of Castle Crag was shot by a man named Taylor on Soda Creek last evening. His wound is dangerous. Further particulars have not yet been received.

Elsinor, Cal., Aug. 11.—Elmer Walters shot and killed Ira Wall the son of a prominent business man and fatally shot Mrs. Wall who was riding in the carriage with her son. It's the settling of an old grudge.

COAST ITEMS.

The boiler-makers in the Great Northern Railroad shops at Great Falls, Mont., are on a strike for higher wages.

The 1,140-foot tunnel of the Fort Bragg Logging Railroad has been completed and a fine body of timber is opened up.

A party of wreckers are on the way from Staten Island to undertake the raising of the San Pedro, sunk off Victoria, B. C.

The War Department will keep four companies of troops at Wallace, Idaho, until their presence is no longer required by the Governor.

The testimony of the Idaho miners points to the fact that the shooting at the Gem and Prisco mines was inaugurated by non-union men. A number of witnesses were examined yesterday.

According to the March census the number of persons in Oregon between the ages of four and twenty years is 111,770, and the amount of money to be distributed for school purposes \$162,600.

H. Taylor aged sixty-eight years who had been looking at some land near Ukiah yesterday, fell dead in the streets on his return. Deceased with his family had been out from England but a few weeks.

During the preliminary examination at Phoenix, A.
