AWFUL MINING DISASTER.

Thirty-nine of the Men Rescued.

BISHOP KIPP DYING IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Goddard to Fight the Winner of the Sullivan-Corbett Match.

Another Mine Disaster.

London, August 26.—News has just been received of a terrible disaster in a coal mine at the little town of Aberkenfig Glamorganshire, Wales.

Soon after the day's shift of men had gone to work a violent explosion took place that sent black smoke rolling up above the surface of the ground and gave notice to the inhabitants of the place that another had been added to the long list of colliery horrors.

It was but a moment before the pit mouth was surrounded by the people of the village, who were in a state of intense excitement and anxiety.

Nothing could be done at the time however as the mine was full of gas, but a rescue force was at once organized to explore the mine at the earliest possible moment. Of the men employed in the mine 141 are unaccounted for, and are believed to be dead. Even if they escaped the explosion they must have been quickly smothered by the deadly choking damp which filled the mine.

Later.—All night long volunteer parties have kept up work at Park Slip pit, the scene of the disastrous explosion in Wales yesterday. At six o'clock this morning they had penetrated 900 yards into the main drift. In all this distance not a sign of life was discovered. Here and there was the body of a miner, but the attitude invariably showed that death had come suddenly. Some of the men had died in the very act of using their picks. Ten bodies were recovered of men who did not have a second's warning of their fate. The bodies of two men were discovered, however, who had apparently made a frantic attempt to escape.

A late dispatch says that while a band of rescuers were working in the pit a sound was heard which caused the men suddenly to suspend. Soon a repetition of the sound was heard, low and weak, but indicating there was life beyond the great wall of rock and debris.

At half past 1 o'clock this afternoon the drift was finally penetrated and thirty-nine imprisoned miners rescued. The scene when they reached the surface was indescribable. Wives, sweethearts, sisters, brothers and in some cases fathers and mothers were in waiting, frantic to see if their loved ones were among the saved. The work of clearing the galleries is still being pushed in hope of saving others.

Long Lost Treasure.

New York, August 27.—The storm yesterday interfered with the work of searching for the treasure which went down with the British ship Hussar 112 years ago. Captain Symonds managed to do some work, however, and the Little Giant dredge brought up a quantity of flints. Glittering among them were two bits of yellow metal which, on being cleaned up, proved to be a watch key and an old fashioned seal. The articles are gold and the seal contains a stone which Captain Symonds thinks is a topaz. Neither stone nor seal bore any initials or engraving.

Fire at Chico

Chico, Cal., Aug. 28.—A fire occurred in this city about 12:30 this morning in a house owned by W. J. Pullams, a blacksmith in the east part of town and rented by S. P. Eldridge. The house and contents is a total loss.

The fire is supposed to be the work of a tramp who had been refused food. Pullams' loss is about \$1,200; insured for \$500 in the Oakland Home Company. Eldridge's loss is \$500; uninsured.

The Soldier Steals Back to the Bosom of His Family.

Yesterday morning Camp Colcord was broken and the tents were pulled down with a rush. Blankets and valises filled with face lotions were rolled up and packed harem scarum and carelessly. Fatigue coats were donned and the pockets stuffed with novels extra socks and copies of the APPEAL.

There was a most excellent assortment of sun burned faces all over the field but most of them were lightened with smiles and exclamations of satisfaction. May a little heart fluttered as Joe McCormack yelled "All aboard" and the puffing of the engine, the ringing of the bell became fainter and fainter with each succeeding cheer of farewell from the platform.

In the evening the passenger train took away the remainder and the depot was mottled with blotches of sad farewells and inward weeping.

Their presence has been of considerable benefit to Carson and their method of conducting themselves would be a good example to any body of men assembled as they were.

They fell naturally into the discipline of the army and unlike the Santa Cruz men, treated their Col. with faultless respect on all occasions.

Their presence has been a lesson to the rising generation and the lesson taught by seeing men accustomed to freedom of speech and action, tying themselves down to martial law and military rule, will not soon be forgotten.


