Election Laws.

Next November the voters of this State will be called upon to vote in an entirely different manner than heretofore.

Before election day read the law. Secure a sample ballot before going to the polls.

Decide for whom you will vote before going into the booth.

Obtain your ballot from one of the clerks of election.

You will only be allowed five minutes in which to prepare your ballot.

Make a cross thus X in the square after the name for which you vote.

The cross must be made only with a lead pencil.

Any other writing or marking will invalidate your ballot.

Fold your ballot before leaving the booth.

Only one voter can occupy a booth at one time.

A voter physically disabled may have the assistance of another elector in preparing his ballot.

Inability to read or write will not be considered a physical disability.

Drunkenness is not a physical disability.

THE FEDERAL BOLTERS.

NINE EX-GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES FLY THE TRACK.

They Try to Bulldoze Thirty-two Silver Men, but Fall by the Wayside.

The Democratic State Central Committee meeting, held in Carson yesterday, in the office of James R. Judge was equivalent to a convention.

When the Weaver and Field men, who are unequivocally in favor of free coinage, signified their intention of standing by the white metal against Cleveland and Harrison...

Their action can be explained by the following political history: With a few exceptions they were all under the Cleveland administration and they expect later on to tap the milk in the cocoanut.

John Dennis, ex-Coiner of the Mint.

J. A. Ryan, ex-Assayer, J. C. Hagerman, ex-Postmaster, of Reno.

C. W. Irish, imported from Iowa under the Cleveland administration, as Surveyor General of Nevada.

M. R. Elstner, ex-watchman of the Mint.

J. Noyes, F. Lemon and Charles Jones, were the other three and all expect eventually to get their hands on the political pap.

When the bolters, who did not wait until the vote for passing third party electors, discovered that no Democratic electors would be placed in nomination, they walked out of the room and discussed the question that seemed to be weighing down their hearts in some secluded spot.

The reason the majority refused to put up electors was because it would militate against the silver cause, and in considering State interests and the cause of silver, being in their judgment, paramount to politics, that the action is justifiable.

They know that their action will be approved by the Democracy of the State and applauded by the supporters of our industries.

The minority kickers then adjourned to the Arlington House parlors and put up a ticket of their own, placing R M Clarke for Senator, J C Hagerman for Congress, Joe Ryan, Thos Winters and M C Riley as Presidential Electors, Fielding Lemmon of Washoe Regent of the University, long term; J F Angel Jr, short term. The alternates are M R Elstner, Chas Bell and E P Hardesty. Judge Belknap was nominated for Supreme Judge.

A good many of the delegates went to Winnemucca last night to see that Weaver and Field were well represented, and the ticket put up by the silver men will positively be elected.


