THE SITUATION IN THE SOUTH

The Populists Certain of Success in Several States.

The following is from the National Executive Committee of the People's Party of the United States:

St. Louis, October 28, 1892.

Geo. S. Nixon, Winnemucca, Nev.: MY DEAR SIR:—The situation in the South at this date is as follows:

In Arkansas and Louisiana the Republicans and People's party have fused on Electors, the Republicans taking four and we four in each State. In Alabama the Republicans will vote for all our Electors unconditionally. The same, I think, will be done in North Carolina. The best information that I can get from Louisiana, from all three sources, is that we will carry that State by twenty or thirty thousand. We will get Alabama, I think, by fifty thousand. Things are at a white heat down there. Since Kolb was egged he has arrested the whole outfit. The Republicans have taken their candidates for Congress out of four districts in North Carolina and will vote for ours. The same has been done in four districts in Virginia, one in West Virginia, two in Kentucky, four in Tennessee, all in Georgia, all in Alabama, three in Mississippi, three in Louisiana, three in Arkansas and four in Texas. In Georgia they have three Electoral tickets, but our candidates for Congress are on both the Republican and People's party tickets. The Democrats carried that State this month by getting the solid negro vote. Their law is that no one is entitled to vote until he pays his poll tax and shows his receipt for the same. The negroes had their poll tax paid by the Democrats and they voted them in return. Now the negro says he has got his tax paid and intends to vote the Republican ticket. Sixty-five thousand out of seventy-five thousand of our voters at the October election in Georgia were white men, in fact a majority of the white vote of Georgia is ours. If we hold that, which we will, and if the negro votes go back to the Republican party, who voted with the Democrats in October, we will carry a majority of the Congressional districts. United States Supervisors and Marshals have been appointed in every precinct in nearly all the States. The chances of fraud have been decreased at least 75 per cent from their State elections. Everything is working as well in the South as could be expected. The Republican Congressional Committee at Washington concede us the balance of power in the next lower house in Congress. In fact I cannot see how we can be defeated out of that. The Northwest has no cause to complain of the situation in the South. Advise every man to stand firm to his colors. The general breaking up is coming on the 8th of November, and I think we shall get as many pieces as any one of the old parties.

JONES FOR WEAVER.

He Takes a Decisive Stand in the Silver Fight.

The regular New York correspondent of the Denver News wires the following interview to that paper:

I met the eloquent and genuine Senator from Nevada, the Hon. John P. Jones, at the Hotel Imperial this morning. "I sail on the 9th," said the Senator, "and not on the 2d, as stated in the morning papers."

"I see the goldbugs have the nightmare again over the floods of silver that the Rothschilds are going to send over here."

"Bah, there is nothing in these chestnut yarns," said Mr. Jones.

"But, Senator, Mr. Seligman tells me there are thirteen millions of surplus silver in Europe likely to be shipped this way."

"That is not half that amount," replied the Senator. "There are no accumulations of silver likely to be shipped to us. The fact is, Europe is bare of floating silver just as they are bare over there of floating American stocks. They thought they were smart in sending back securities to this country to get the gold to liquidate so as to meet the demand from Austria and Russia, to say nothing of the Baring liquidation, and they now find they have lost their standard paying stocks and income securities. The scramble for gold in Europe now shows them they are making a mistake in hoarding gold. They are worse off than we are."

"But they will learn nothing from experience. They are determined to hoard gold, and if they continue there will not be gold enough to go around or to redeem the enormous amount of debts redeemable in gold. Cornushi is right. This country ought to take advantage of the low price of silver to resume free coinage. This country is the producer of two-thirds of the silver of the world and ought to make the price of silver instead of knocking down to the Rothschilds. The low price of silver affects the price of all our agricultural products and I expect to see wheat at sixty cents this Fall and cotton at five cents a pound. There is only one thing that will stop this shrinkage in values."

"If the West and South stand solid for Weaver and assert their balance of power by carrying four or five States for the General, you will see a substantial rise in silver, and that means a higher price for all our agricultural products. If there were a Weaver ticket in the field in this State and the people were aroused, he could draw off 50,000 voters from Cleveland, who is the determined and persistent advocate of free coinage, and known to be such. The people of this country will learn by experience, and a bitter one at that. Since 1873, I considered there has been a constantly increasing distress on account of the outflow of silver, and that distress is still increasing. I regard the people of the East as either insane or totally ignorant in regard to their real interest. Flush times, plenty of money and high prices are better for a country like this than low prices and hard times when a few Wall street goldbugs and monopolists are the only ones who prosper. France, a stationary country, has nearly \$50 per capita in circulation, while this country has not more than \$15 per capita, and half of that is in silver money and certificates."

"I think Weaver will carry Colora-

do, Nevada, Washington, Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, North Carolina, and he may carry Alabama and South Carolina. I tell you, you are right. The people of the South and West mean to show in this election that they hold the balance of power, and that they are not to be bound down to the East any longer."

"Will the Silver Conference amount to anything?"

"I have very grave doubts of anything being done. The European monometallists are wedded to their idol, and so long as the gold droppings of the golden calf drip into their coffers they will not favor silver. When another scramble for gold comes, and they have another Baring panic, they will be driven to remonetize silver, just as this country will be driven by a real experience of which we have not yet seen the worst."

A Matter of Affidavits.

Hy Doane, then and now the County Clerk of Ormsby county, Nevada, came to the store of this affiant in Carson City Nevada and purchased a bill of goods and supplies for the use of Ormsby county, and after having made the purchase said Doane asked this affiant what commission he was going to allow him, said Doane, upon the purchase made by him for the county, and in reply affiant declined to pay or allow any commission; and affiant further states that since said date he has been unable to sell or furnish said Ormsby county with any stationery or supplies through the county Clerk, except a few office diaries and memorandum calendars.

A Taxpayers' Ticket.

When the Silver ticket was put in the field it was charged by Republicans with being a riff-raff ticket.

The Silver men of Ormsby are quite willing to compare the two tickets. The tax roll shows that in round numbers the Silver candidates pay on \$27,000 worth of taxable property. The Republican candidates pay on \$17,000.
