PLATFORM.

We believe that the time has come when party prejudices and party names should be discarded by all true citizens of Nevada and a united effort made to re-establish the industries of our State.

The names Democrat and Republican should no longer divide the friends of free coinage of Silver, and all who think alike should act together, regardless of past party names and affiliations.

We believe that no Democrat or Republican of Nevada can vote for either Cleveland or Harrison without violating the principles of his party as declared in the Winemucca and Virginia City Conventions; but that they can consistently vote for the nominees of the People's Party Convention, James B. Weaver and James G. Field, the only candidates who stand upon a platform demanding the free and unlimited coinage of Silver.

We reaffirm the declaration of principles of the Reno and Winemucca Silver Party State Conventions and endorse their nominees.

Believing that absolute secrecy and purity of the ballot box are essential to the proper exercise of free suffrage, our legislative nominees are hereby pledged to oppose any attempt to repeal or destroy the effect of the Australian ballot law.

The nominees of our party are pledged to the economic administration of County affairs, the impartial administration of justice in our local Courts, the equitable levy of taxes and an obedience to the law in the letting of County contracts.

We recognize the fact that Wm. M. Stewart has served the people of this State faithfully, and deserves the gratitude and cordial support of all honest and fair-minded men.

Believing his re-election to be indispensable to success in the pending contest for free and unlimited coinage of Silver, we hereby pledge our Assembly nominees to vote for Wm. M. Stewart for United States Senator from Nevada.

We further recognize in Francis G. Newlands a man perfectly competent to represent Nevada in the House of Representatives where his presence is urgently demanded at this time to protect the material interests of our State, and we hereby pledge him our earnest and united support.

SILVER PLATFORM.

The silver party of Nevada in convention assembled at Winnemucca, Nevada, declares as follows: Whereas, Mr. Cleveland was elected in 1884 on the following silver platform: "We believe in honest money, the gold and silver coinage of the constitution, and a circulating medium convertible into such money without loss," and immediately after the election recommended the repeal of the Bland act and the utter demonetization of silver, and used the entire influence of his administration to reduce the money of the world to the single gold standard, and was defeated by the people in 1888; and

Whereas, Mr. Harrison in 1888 was elected on the following platform: "The Republican party is in favor of the use of both gold and silver as money, and condemns the policy of the Democratic administration in its efforts to demonetize silver;" and after his election insisted upon the repeal of the Bland act and the substitution therefor of the celebrated Winemucca silver bullion bill, by the terms which bullion was to be deposited in the treasury and certificates issued therefor; redeemable in bullion, not in money, which would have placed silver upon a like footing with wheat, cotton or any other commodity deposited and warehouse receipts issued thereon. The compromise act of 1890 was extorted from him to save the tariff, and since its passage every beneficial feature it contained has been thwarted by the administration of the government and the refusal of the treasury department, by direction of the president, to use silver as money or to coin silver, as required by the act, to provide for the redemption of the treasury notes issued in the purchase of bullion; and

Whereas, Mr. Harrison has repudiated the platform of his party made at Minneapoli, which was sufficiently radical for gold to satisfy the gold press, and now declares in his letter of acceptance that he is opposed to independent action on the part of the United States, but is in favor of an international conference, provided the ratio can be so changed as to make the commercial value of the silver dollar equal to the commercial value of the gold dollar, which it is impossible for the market price of silver ever to reach to advance. He would take advantage of the "bear" movement of the conspiracy between England and the treasury department to depress the price of silver, and be combination of the nations of the world maintain for the benefit of the owners of gold such depressed prices; and

Whereas, the administration and the gold men in the Republican party in the 51st congress conspired to consolidate the government by depriving the people of a free ballot by the passage of the odious force bill, which provides for the appointment of an unlimited number of supervisors of election and deputy marshals, to be paid out of the treasury of the United States from a standing appropriation. This would enable the executive to have hundreds of thousands of political workers at the polls, with power of supervision of the returns of elections throughout the United States; and

Whereas, All the silver men in the house of representatives except those from the mining states, were bitterly opposed to the force bill and regarded it as destructive of free government and designed to secure negro domination in the south; and

Whereas, The force bill passed the house of representatives by only six majority, and the following so-called silver Republicans, namely: Hosea Townsend of Colorado; H. E. Bartine Nevada; Binger Hermann, Oregon, and Thos. H. Carter Montana, had the power to defeat it by severing themselves from the gold advocates and joining with the friends of silver, but they refused to do so, and thereby created a breach between the silver producing states and the great mass of silver men in the west and south, which has ever since contributed to prevent the passage of a free coinage bill in the house; and

Whereas, William M. Stewart was the first Republican in the senate to join hands with the silver men in the Democratic party in the defeat of the force bill in the senate and by his efforts, with the aid of a portion of the silver Republicans, rescued the country from the calamity which that revolutionary measure would have caused, and a silver party was created in the senate sufficiently strong to pass through that body in the last and in the present congress a free coinage bill pure and simple. The bill which passed in the 52d congress was postponed in the house and is still pending for action; and

Whereas, the indorsement of the Harrison policy of the federal interference in local elections, as exemplified in the force bill, would place the fate of Nevada in opposition to the friends of silver throughout the country; therefore, he it

Resolved, That the silver party of Nevada condemns the policy of the Cleveland administration for its efforts to demonetize silver, and denounces the Republican administration for its attempt to deprive the people of a free ballot, and for its active and determined efforts to destroy silver as money. We denounce the letter of acceptance of President Harrison for opposing independent action on the part of the United States and for advocating the submission of the financial policy of the United States to the dictates of the bankers of Great Britain and the gold advocates of Europe and condemn his suggestion to foreign pow-

ers so to change the ratio between gold and silver that silver can no longer be used as money.

This convention recognizes James B. Weaver of Iowa and James G. Field of Virginia as the only candidates for President and vice-president who are friends to the use of silver as money, and the free and unlimited coinage of that metal; and we heartily and unequivocally indorse Weaver and Field as the standard bearers of the Silver party of Nevada and pledge them our support. The nominees of this convention are also hereby pledged to work and vote for the standard bearers of our cause, and to use every honorable means to defeat the enemies of silver—Harrison and Cleveland.

This convention repudiates the sham pretense that Weaver will be defeated and that votes for him will be lost. Every great reform must have a beginning. Too much time has already been lost in voting for the agents of the gold trust, which action has paralyzed the industries of the country and ruined silver mining in Nevada. The indorsement already given by the silver States of the advocates of gold in former elections is used as an argument to show that the silver States themselves are opposed to the free and unlimited coinage of silver. The movement for silver is now advancing with resistless force under the lead of our gallant standard bearer James B. Weaver. The people of Nevada will not stay the tide by voting for either Harrison or Cleveland, the representatives of gold monopoly, but will proclaim to their friends throughout the country that Nevada stands firm against the usurpation of federal power in local elections and against the gold monopoly of Europe and America.

The platform and resolutions of the convention of the Silver party of Nevada held at Reno on the 24th of June, 1892, are hereby approved and adopted, and Hon. Thomas Wren of Eureka, Hon. M. S. Bonniwell of Winnemucca and Hon. C. C. Powning of Reno, who were nominated at that Convention as presidential electors, are hereby directed to cast their votes in the electoral college for James B. Weaver of Iowa for President and James G. Field of Virginia for Vice-president.

This convention indorses the course of our Senator, the Hon. Wm. M. Stewart, in his untiring and successful efforts in the cause of silver, and in securing the defeat of the force bill, the pet measure of the Harrison administration. We tender him our thanks for his efficient services in obtaining legislation beneficial to our State; in aiding to endow the State University; in reopening the Mint; in securing the completion of the Government building; in establishing the Indian school; in securing the recommendation of the interior department for the abandonment of the Walker River reservation; in limiting the extent of the Pyramid Lake Indian reservation to the legitimate requirements of the Indians and providing them with the means of irrigation by the construction of an irrigation canal; in obtaining the passage of the bill providing for the payment of the Pute war claims repeatedly through the Senate; in compiling the evidence and securing the adjustment in the war department of the rebellion claims, amounting to over \$400,000; in securing favorable reports in both houses of Congress for the payment of the same, and in having a bill passed through the Senate for that purpose; in taking advantage of a favorable moment to secure the passage of the Scott law for the exclusion of Chinese, and for his fidelity in attending to all the business and interests of the people of Nevada.

This Convention indorses and recommends his re-election to the U. S. Senate as Nevada's champion in the cause of silver.

All nominees of this Convention are required to accept this platform and resolutions, and pledge themselves in good faith to adhere to and be bound by the principles herein enunciated.

Resolved, That the railroad as a factor in our civilization is only valuable as a safe, cheap and rapid means of transportation for persons and property. That the monopoly of railroads has subverted their usefulness to the people by mismanagement in operation, converting them into a dear means of transportation. We, therefore, heartily endorse the scheme of the San Francisco and Great Salt Lake railroad company to construct a competing line of road across our State and country.

Whereas, Certain enemies of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 assembled at Reno on the 31st day of August last, styling themselves a Republican convention, nominated anti-silver Harrison presidential electors and an anti-silver candidate for Congress and anti-silver Harrison candidates for Regents of the State University; and

Whereas, Certain other enemies of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 assembled at Carson City on the 14th inst, styling themselves the Democratic State Central Committee, nominated anti-silver Cleveland presidential electors and an anti-silver Cleveland candidate for Congress and anti-silver Cleveland candidates for Regents of the State University; and

Whereas, The present Secretary of State is believed to be in full sympathy and accord with both of these organizations, and will probably recognize each as the regular representatives of their respective parties, and place the nominees on the State ticket as such; and

Whereas, It will be necessary for the Silver Party of Nevada to nominate candidates for Congress, Judge

of the Supreme Court and Regents of the State University by certificates of nomination under the statutes,

Resolved, That this Convention recommend the members of the Silver Party of this State to sign the certificates of nomination of Francis G. Newlands for Congress, C. H. Belknap for Judge of the Supreme Court, H. L. Fish for Regent of the State University for long term, and C. E. Mack for Regent of the State University for short term, all of said parties being members of the Silver Party of Nevada and in favor of the election of James B. Weaver and James G. Field for President and Vice-President of the United States.
