

**Needs a Railroad.**

Mason Valley is experiencing quite a healthy little boom, and the price of farms and building lots is continually increasing. Not a vacant house is to be found in the town of Greenfield, and new houses are being built as fast as carpenters can put them up. New families are settling in the valley and the population is increasing quite rapidly. Times are easier now than for many years past, the farmers are getting out of debt and the entire country is showing thrift and prosperity. The one thing that would help the valley out more than anything else, says the Dayton Times, is a railroad through its upper end. It was a mistake the C. & C. railroad was not built up through Greenfield when it was constructed. Now it is twelve miles from the heart of the valley and this makes it very inconvenient in shipping and receiving freight. It makes it more expensive for the farmers to get their produce to market and it cuts off considerable revenue from the road, however we believe that the time will come when the C. & C. company will change its roadbed so as to run up close to Greenfield, and there is a possibility also that a road may run the whole length of the valley, up through Smith valley and over to California. This would make the town of Greenfield a thriving little railroad centre, the surrounding country would be cut up into small farms and the population quadrupled.

**Organize.**

Silver clubs should now be established in every mining camp in the Territory. We are on the right track to secure the remonetization of silver; therefore, let us strike while the iron is hot, and not only hold our own, but pass on the goal we are striving to reach.—Salt Lake Mining Journal.

It might be a good thing if the legal lights of the State would look up the matter and render an opinion for the guidance of the coming session of the Legislature. The people were cheated out of the Constitutional Convention but it is not too late to remedy the wrong.

Shortly before election the Carson Tribune claimed that if a Stewart Legislature was elected it was afraid that the Australian ballot law would be repealed. It also accused the Silver party men of trying to do something wrong with the ballots, but stated that the law would not permit of the purchase of votes with any certainty of delivery—in fact, the new law was just the thing to give voters independence. This week the same paper claims to have information that cost Stewart and Newlands \$30,000 to carry Ormsby county.
