Cleveland Carries California by 300 Plurality.

Archbishop Walsh a Bi-metalist.

London, November 28.—Bi-metalism has found an advocate in Archbishop Walsh of Dublin. In the course of an interview of bi-metalism is a matter of imperative necessity to save the Irish tenants from inevitable ruin.

It was disheartening the Archbishop added, to find that no interest is taken in the question by the leaders of the Irish Parliamentary party. If things go on as they are, even the excellent land purchase scheme may become, before many years, a source of widespread disaster to the purchaser under it.

According to the Archbishop's views foreign competition is not at all the sole cause of the ruinous fall in the prices of agricultural products. The main cause, he believes, is in the continuous rise in the value of gold. "What a prospect it is," he added, "for the Irish tenants whose judicial rents are fixed for fifteen years or for the tenants with annual purchase payments extending forty-nine years, that gold has risen 35 per cent in value within the last fifteen years and must continue to appreciate if the present system is maintained."

The Archbishop concluded by expressing the hope that the conference at Brussels would succeed in solving the monetary problem.

Musical Recital.




