

JAY GOULD'S DEATH.

Jay Gould has passed to his long account, leaving his millions behind him. From nothingness and poverty he rose to be one of the richest men in the world.

His career as a money maker was not founded on Ben Franklin's remark, that "Honesty is the best policy." He possessed a peculiar gift that made him a wizard of finance.

Not many years ago he was selling a mouse trap, a trap of his own invention. He got his start in life from these sales. He was associated with James Fisk and while Fisk accumulated with daring speculations Gould held onto the profits. After Fisk's death by a bullet from Ned Stokes, Gould became the leading financier of Wall street.

He trod the only true path to great financial success. He never trusted a living soul; he was perfectly conscienceless, unscrupulous and merciless in his business dealings.

He met the greatest money generals in Wall Street, and they were mere children in his hands.

One after another those who crossed swords with him went down to poverty and bankruptcy.

In the wildest panics he never lost his head. When the billows of financial disaster were piling wrecks of great houses and great names on the reefs of stock speculations, Gould's boat rode as safe as if it floated on a placid Summer sea, and every storm that swept the stock market hustled wealth into Gould's coffers.

No man living knew whether Gould was long or short on the market, when he sold or when he bought, and every stroke he dealt to his enemies meant money for him.

While he was struggling to the front and learning the ropes of stock speculation, he was trampled on and snubbed by men who afterwards felt his vengeance.

He was the king of American finance and he made men who had formerly slighted him cringe and crawl at the foot of his throne. He was feared and hated by everybody and his death will not call forth many mourners.

As the head of a family however, his character was unimpeachable. He was in spite of his stern business habits, a man of sunny disposition, jovial and agreeable, worshipped by his family in whom he took the greatest pride.

His grounds, upon which vast wealth had been lavished, were always open to the public, and in private life he was regarded as the most benevolent and unselfish of the New York millionaires.

A Preacher's Sensational Story.

A Committee of the M. E. Church which has been in session in Sacramento for several days investigating the charges against Rev. Frank E. Callum of Elk Grove, has completed its labors. He was found guilty and relieved of his pulpit until the meeting of the conference next September. The preacher was charged with having clandestinely left his work and with misrepresentation. A couple of months ago Mr. Callum mysteriously disappeared from his residence, and it was believed he had been robbed and murdered and his body hidden. Finally, however, he turned up in Omaha. He related a very sensational story to the effect that he had been bound, gagged and blindfolded by two men, who took him in a carriage to the mountains and put on board a train and ordered him to leave the country with a warning that he would be killed if he ever returned to Elk Grove. The church committee refused to believe the story. He acted as his own counsel.
