The Homestead Poisoning.

Philadelphia, Jan. 3.—Members of the Executive Board of the Knights of Labor are investigating the report which connects leading members of the order with the alleged attempt to poison non-union men at Homestead. They say that if the charges are proved the men and their acts will be repudiated by all true members of the order. It is not a criminal organization, and it does not knowingly harbor criminals or allow them to remain among its membership.

They do not, however, propose to prejudice any one. They say that there is great eagerness very often to implicate members of organized labor bodies, and especially the Knights of Labor and officers of the order, in real or imaginary plots of all kinds, and they are painfully aware that in some quarters justice is not to be looked for when such members or officers are under criticism. Hence the accusations against the men at Pittsburg should be received with caution until something definite has been shown.

The Executive Board of the Knights of Labor does not appear to be particularly worried over the action of the recent convention of the Federation of Labor in resolving it out of existence. In the current number of the official journal of the order it refers to the chief opponents of the knights as individuals of unsavory kidney, whom the knights out of regard for their reputation have been forced to expel. In the face of recent occurrences at Baltimore Rochester and elsewhere it says, and in the face of the fact that the very men who made the attack have been expelled from the Knights of Labor for various forms of dishonesty and disloyalty, it must have required some hardihood to declare war upon the knights. At any rate it is just possible that the rank and file of the trades unions of the country may think that there would be more honesty, more wisdom and more loyalty to the cause of labor in fighting the common enemy than in fighting another trades organization.

The Oakla Tragedy.

Oakland, Jan. 3.—There was a tragedy during the night at Oakland Junction on the San Leandro Electric road between Hayward and San Leandro. Two men are now lying dead and a woman is so seriously wounded that she will not recover. The woman and her husband had been stopping at the house of a Portuguese saloon keeper and while the two men were intoxicated a row started in which the saloon keeper shot the husband and wife and then killed himself. All the parties were Portuguese.

Cut His Throat.

Livermore, Cal., Jan. 3.—Last night about 8 o'clock Louis Nutson was discovered lying beside a fence with his throat cut from ear to ear.

One year ago yesterday Nutson was injured in the coal mines here and has never fully recovered from his injuries.

Dependancy over this is supposed to have been the cause of his rash act.

The coroner's jury found a verdict of suicide in accordance with the above facts.

The fact that John Sherman champions the Nicaragua canal subsidy scheme should be sufficient to stamp the measure with suspicion. District Court.

The Court met yesterday morning. Judge Rising presiding.




