## THE FISH LAW.

It is Alleged to Have Been Passed By a Ring.

There is going to be a hot fight this session over the fish law. It is claimed that it has the very opposite effect from which it was intended.

The Wadsworth Dispatch has the following:

The fish law of Nevada, as it stands upon the statutes to-day, is an absurdity and a farce. It has no merits and works just opposite to what the law makers intended it should work. It is of no protection to the fish and there is no justice in it to the fish or the people who fish for a livelihood or for pleasure.

More than one of the legislators of the fifteenth session informed the writer that the Legislature was lobbied in the interest of the present law by men who made many misrepresentations to accomplish their ends.

There were few men in the fifteenth session of the Nevada Legislature who had enough practical knowledge of the matter to vote intelligently upon the measure when it came up before them for consideration.

The present law does not protect the fish, was not made to protect the fish, but was made in the interest of half a dozen so call sportsmen of the upper Truckee who had a "pull." The "pull" was strong enough to drag Fish Commissioner Mills into the fight, and to make him trade everything in the country round for the nonsensical law which does not protect.

Fish Commissioner Mills was asked to come to Wadsworth and make an investigation. He was offered every available means to enable him to look into the matter thoroughly and judge for himself. If the evidence offered did not convince him of his error, no opposition would be offered to any measure he might suggest or propose.

There is no fairness in a decision addeed from the testimony of one side, and that side sadly lacking in practical knowledge and experience. We court a fair and impartial trial, and this being granted, we are willing to abide by the decision.

### Death of Ned Cahill.

Ned Cahill the well known stock broker, died recently in San Francisco. He has been with all the ups and downs of the stock market for a quarter of a century and never handled a dishonest dollar in all that time.

During the Comstock excitement in 1864 Mr. Cahill went to Virginia City and entered the stock-brokerage business. In 1866 he joined the San Francisco Stock and Exchange Board, which was then in the fourth year of its existence, and the firm of Edward Cahill & Co. became very prominent in the financial world. He continued as a member of the Board and went through all the vicissitudes of the business up to Wednesday last, when, owing to his failing health, he retired in favor of his nephew, Edward F. Cahill, who was elected a member in his place and who has succeeded to his business.

He was a noble fellow all through, and now has gone to the land where the market booms without a single break and the margin of everlasting forgiveness is as wide as the floors of heaven.


