

THE PRISON CHARGES.

In another column is the report of the State Prison committee of the House, relative to the shortage alleged to have occurred in the latter part of Warden Bell's administration wherein he shipped cut stone to Reno for his own use and did not account for it.

Today the committee appointed by the Senate will meet and further investigate the matter. The APPEAL has no disposition to prejudice this case. The same charges have been hovering in the air and hanging over Mr. Bell for the past four years and in justice to himself he should have an opportunity of disproving them.

The charges are not new to Mr. Bell. The Ormsby County Central Committee placed him in possession of a certified copy of the charges more than a week ago in order that he might not be taken unawares, but have ample time to prepare his defense for the investigation that takes place today.

He is now a candidate for the same office. If he is guilty of the alleged shortage no honorable man can go on record as voting for him. If he can prove his innocence, the least the Legislature can do in way of reparation for the injury done his reputation, would be to elect him Warden unanimously.

What the Legislature and the public want are the facts.

CHURCHILL HEARD FROM.

Stillwater, Nev., Jan. 18, 1892. EDITOR DISPATCH:

As the wisdom of the State has convened to make laws for their constituency, perhaps we might not be egotistic in suggesting a few things that the people of the State certainly demand a change in. "A prudent man lives within his income," likewise a State. Our State is annually shrinking in population and taxable property and if you go over the State you will find ranches that formally gave employment to 20, 30 and 40 men, now hiring 4, 6 and 8, and the farmers dig early and late, and finds out at tax-paying time that his taxes have increased, and his farm and what he has around him to sell declines in value, save and except sheep, and they are not in the hands of the farmers in general.

We pay a Governor \$5,000 per year, Lieutenant Governor \$2,700, when \$3,000 to \$2,000 is ample. It costs about \$24,000 a year to maintain the Supreme Court when Utah along side of us gets along without any. Compare her population with ours, then think of her varied interests, not mentioning its small matter of wealth. A very wise statesman once said: "The country is governed to much." The Secretary of State's office salary is \$5,000, it should be run for \$2,000, what the deputy now gets. Controllers office costs \$7,000 when \$2,000 that is now paid for deputy is ample. The State Treasurer's office costs \$5,000. This is a responsible trust, say lay off \$1,000. The Attorney General \$3,000. Cut off at least \$1,000. Supt. of Public Instruction receives \$2,400 when \$2,000 would certainly remunerate him. The balance of the officers paid by the State to run the Printing office \$2,000, Washers Service \$600, Prison \$2,000 Orphans Home \$1,000, Insane Asylum \$2,000, are perhaps nearer in keeping with the revenue of the State and its services. Then there is the Legislature with \$8. per day, and an army of attaches that they create. They manage to pass the appropriation bills every year. Now when you ask a politician about curtailing the State expense you generally receive the very satisfactory answer: "Oh it costs them all their salaries, and they will circumscribe accordingly." "How long, Oh Lord, How long," are the people of this State going to stand it? Let every tax-payer talk through the medium of the press, who are ever ready to champion the peoples cause, exclaiming with one accord. Vox populi Vox Dei.

What a splendid opportunity this Legislature has to work for retrenchment and reform. The Third House of the Republicans and Democrats are not "in it." Its a straight Silver party, and now do your duty to your overburdened taxed constituents, and when you return receive that heavenly plaudit. Well done," and a gratifying conscience besides. Only think of it; over sixty thousand dollars paid to State officers alone.

People all cry out against the railroad charge, being about 25 per cent of the volume of everything shipped in and out of the State—and when you apply to them for redress; they say, "Well, what are you going to do about it." But the wisdom of the State get their power from or by the consent of the governed.
