

THE CHARGES AGAINST BELL.

The investigation yesterday before the Committee of the Whole in the House, drew a large crowd of interested spectators.

The charges were prosecuted by William Woodburn and defended by Thomas Wren. The defense made by Bell against the charge that the Longabaugh rock was really used for Bell, was good.

Bell, however, was unable to explain why he had not made an accounting to the State of the rock sold, or why he did not swear to his monthly reports as the law directed.

He says he paid it to the Clerk, yet it is in evidence that when he sent in his monthly report for May, 1885, he made no mention of it.

If clerks and bookkeepers could pocket money paid in by the Warden and he not notice it, even when he was the contracting party in the transaction, there is no telling how much more they got away with.

The reports showed that months went by and work turned out by the Prison quarries was not mentioned by the Warden in his reports.

Mr. Craven swore that he paid Bell \$27 on a certain date for waste rock. It is not disputed that Craven hauled the rock, and that Bell was in the habit of collecting for it.

These are the facts shown by the investigation as near as we are able to state them.

The committee voted, with one exception, that the charges had not been proven, laying the whole matter at the door of careless bookkeeping.

Bell Wins.

Last night the allied forces went down, and Bell, Wallace and Powning swept the field.

In the afternoon Brown, the man who had all along been swearing that he would pack his dinner bucket in to the mines before he would surrender to Bell, went over to the enemy and agreed to take second place.

Bell Exonerated.

In the House last evening the Committee of the Whole voted to ignore the charges against Bell. The vote stood 29 for Bell, and one against; Reynolds of Ormsby voting against the resolution.
