## NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

### SENATE.

Called to order at 11 A. M. Lieut. Gov. Pougade, presiding.

Roll call, and all present. Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. G. R. Bird.

Reading of the Journal etc. Half an hour spent in correction of Journal. President finally authorized to see that the requisite corrections were made and the Journal re-read.

S B 7, Patchen, reconsidered for corrections. Recess from 11:40 till 11:58.

Senate recalled to order at 11:58 p. m. Lieut. Pougade, presiding and by invitation ex-Gov. Adams occupied a seat beside him.

The roll call showed all present except Mr. Foley, absent from sickness.

The President announced that the time had arrived, under the provisions of the Constitution for the election of United States Senator.

Mr. La Grave nominated Wm. M. Stewart, seconded by Williamson, both making neat and appropriate remarks. No other nomination.

The vote under roll call resulted: Stewart, 14. Absent, Foley.

Mr. Stewart was declared the choice of the Senate, to succeed himself as United States Senator from Nevada.

Mr. Giguoux of the State Prison Committee reported progress of investigation and asked further time for report. Granted.

At 12:29 recess till 2 p. m.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

A communication was read from Dr. Lewis of Reno stating that Senator Foley was now lying very ill under his medical care in Reno and would not be able to leave his bed for several days.

President Pougade directed the various clerks of the Senate to meet him at his office directly after adjournment in order to correct and straighten out the Journal.

A B 7, by Patchen, Reported back from Lincoln county delegation amended. Ordered engrossed.

On motion of Comins, Senate substitute for A B No. 3, reported from the Ways and Means committee, now came up for consideration. Fixes the number of officers and attaches of the Legislature, specifies their duties and fixes their pay. The only changes are in giving a porter to each House, at \$3 each per day, and enrolling clerk and one committee clerk to the Assembly at \$5 per day each. Substitute adopted 9 to 1. At 3:10 adjourned.

### ASSEMBLY.

Called to order at the regular hour by speaker Bell in the chair.

Roll call and all present. Prayer by the Chaplain.

Reading and adoption of minutes. By Massey—Resolution relative to the election of a U. S. Senator in joint session Jan. 25.

By Lernhart introduction of A B No. 11; Act regulating granting of certificates to teachers in the State. Committee on education.

By Hilp—A B No. 12 Act to create a Legislature fund. Set apart \$25,000. Committee of the whole.

By Hamill, Introduction of a joint resolution memorializing the Legislature of Idaho in regard to construction of fish ladders in the Bruno river Idaho. Declared out of order.

By Wheeler—Act to regulate the settlement of the estates of deceased persons, inter-state committee on Judiciary.

A B 4—Requiring publication by County Commissioners of all bills allowed. Mr. Massey appointed a committee of one to amend the bill to provide for a method of publication in counties having no newspapers. Amendment carried and bill ordered engrossed.

Message from Senate announcing passage of A. Con. Res., relative to appointment of joint committee to inquire into the status of the Constitutional Amendments.

By Folsom—Motion to proceed with the election of a United States Senator. Carried.

Assemblyman Folsom, of Ormsby nominated Hon. Wm. M. Stewart for United States Senator, seconded by Pike.

Hon. Wm. M. Stewart received the unanimous vote of the Assembly.

A faro game was opened at Andy Robert's, Globe Saloon, Monday night and will be open at 2 o'clock each afternoon.

## UNANIMOUS FOR STEWART

### NEVADA WILL RETURN ITS SILVER CHAMPION.

Some of the Nominating Speeches.

In the Senate yesterday Senator La-Grave nominated W. M. Stewart for U. S. Senator, speaking as follows:

L'GRAVE'S ELOQUENCE.

MR. PRESIDENT:

I nominate for United States Senator, Nevada's Great Champion, one against whom I have fought politically for more than twenty years until now the whirligig of time has brought us with in the piles of the same party.

He is the unquestioned leader in the mighty struggle for the rights of the people.

His untiring energy, his unflinching zeal and world wide reputation point to him as the one best fitted to lead the friends of the white metal in the battle for free coinage.

Nevada honors herself in honoring him. I nominate Wm. M. Stewart for United States Senator, from Nevada.

Williamson in seconding the nomination spoke as follows:

WILLIAMSON'S ORATORY.

MR. PRESIDENT:

It is with pleasure that I rise to second the nomination of Wm. M. Stewart for United States Senator.

In doing so I voice and vote the sentiments of the people of Lander, a silver producing county. Depend on upon the resources of her mines for existence, and to show her gratitude for past services, and full confidence in him in the future to represent us again in the Senate of the United States.

I knew him as one of the old '49 Pioneers of the Pacific Coast, mining in California and Nevada. I know him as a lawyer and legislator, thumbing the pages of Backus and Bouvier. I know him as a Senator and "True Blue" Silver Champion of Nevada's rights, faithful and true to our interests.

At this particular time we cannot send to the Senate one who can wield the power and influence for us that Mr. Stewart will. His knowledge and experience on the Silver question will greatly assist our free coinage cause and the money question. As a brilliant statesman he stands in the front rank and in the Senate of the United States the peer of any in debate, logic and argument.

The valleys respond to the mountains, our farmers and our miners are marching together to return him. They know him to be a hard worker and an aggressive fighter for the cause of Silver. The people of Nevada highly appreciate his valuable services. He will entertain John Sherman and inform him that we the citizens of Nevada, are no white slaves to Wall street, "gold bugs," or their self-h designs.

Upon roll call, Mr. President I will record my vote for Nevada's choice, the Grand Old Roman, Wm. M. Stewart.

The vote was unanimous except Foley who was absent.

FOLSON'S WINGED WORDS.

In the House Frank Folsom nominated Stewart and spoke as follows:

MR. SPEAKER:

I rise before this honorable body for the purpose of presenting to you the name of one with whom many of you are personally acquainted and who for over thirty years has been identified as a lawyer or statesman with the interests of our State.

He was with us when this Battle Born State first knocked for admission to the sisterhood of States; and to him is due, as much as to any other man, all of the important features of our Constitution. He gave the weight of his legal power, not only to the new State as a whole, but to those specific interests on which the welfare of the State, and the Nation depended; for had it not been for the ballion which our mines so generously yielded and sent forth, our financial interests must have suffered greatly in the hour of our Nation's peril and need.

He was the first man elected to represent us in the Senate at Washington and his locks have grown white in the service of our State and Nation.

To his legal knowledge, energy and influence, is mainly due the permanent settlement of title of nearly all the mines on the great Comstock Lode.

I need not specify the many efforts he has made nor the much he has accomplished for the welfare of our State and our citizens.

No man has so persistently, so

faithfully labored in our behalf as the honorable gentleman to whom I refer.

He has come unscathed through the tempest of strife; his name stands unscathed by the innuendoes of his enemies and the mighty influence of moneyed magnates.

He has always proved faithful to the paramount interests of this State and has sought every means available to restore silver to its legitimate basis and give us free-coinage.

He is now in the front of the battle, in the face of strong opposition wielding with all the power of his strong arm his silver mounted sword for its metalism, against the almost invincible power of the monopolists and the combined forces of Wall Street. Our prosperity as a State hangs upon the success of his herculean efforts.

Hoping that those efforts will be crowned with success, and that prosperity will again be ours to enjoy, I need say no more, but will now place in nomination for the high and exalted position of United States Senator from Nevada, The Hon. W. M. Stewart.

PIKE'S MAGNETIC ADDRESS.

Assemblyman Pike, the native orator spoke without notes as he always does, and made one of the happiest speeches of the day. It was magnetic eloquence, but not having been committed to paper the APPEAL was unable to secure it.

Today on joint ballot Stewart will be elected for another six years.


