POWNING'S BANQUET SPEECH.

He Dilates On the Usefulness of Young Blood.

Gen. C. C. Powning, who received the highest vote on the Silver ticket last Fall, was called upon to respond to the toast "The Young men of the Party" at the Stewart banquet at Carson Thursday evening. He responded as follows:

Gentlemen: I am delighted to acknowledge the compliments of the toastmaster. It is not often that such a choice literary dish is printed on the menu.

I do not recall that such a toast was ever before offered or responded to in the State at a banquet of a political character, and yet the graciousness of this occasion is largely due to the active, energetic, enthusiastic campaigning of the young men of the State and of the Silver Party. It was a very bad boy who sat upon his father's knee and took his inspiration from the memories of the mound builders that infested sections of the State ages and ages ago, and cast his vote for this or that party because his dear papa told him that his grandfather had been a Whig or a Democrat in '49 or any other time.

There is poverty in the thought that the young should profit by the experience of their elders. Regrets are useless after mistakes are made, but the young men of the State of Nevada in the campaign of '92 determined to break away from the prejudices and passions of the past, and to fight for the most vital issue of the present and future. They "point with pride" to nearly 5,000 majority in a contest for a great principle, against the combined forces of those who were so misguided in ratiocination as to hug the mirage of broken promises, disappointed hopes, destructive casualties, at once the perspective and background of the picture of party fealty to which they clung because it formerly had been a pleasure under the mistletoe of duty to State and all the world, the young men lovingly imbedded in their hearts the kiss of the free and unlimited coinage of silver as received from the lips of their veteran instructors, and far happier, than fair maidens of olden times, marched on in the glorious cause. It was some of their excitement that kindled new fire in the eye and soul of the bold, aggressive, valiant Henry IV of the Silver cause, and whom we delight to honor upon this occasion. The persuasive logic, penetrating intellect and force of character of the Hon. Thomas Wren was a tower of strength to the young Captains and Lieutenants. The published utterances of the gray-haired editor of the Reno Journal and his contemporaries made the victory much easier than contemplated.

The youngsters also bear in grateful remembrance the advice and counsel of Bonfield, Deal, Julien, Bergstein, and other active leaders in the cause.

But who can overlook the dash and vim of the alert upright, nimble Nixon, the Chairman of the State Committee or of the urbanity, civility and courteousness of Flannery, the Secretary; or the services rendered by the eloquent effectual, effective Mack; or the bewitching, independent, fascinating Hoppin; or of the adroit, skillful, dexterous Bowler; or of the able, capable, correct Norcross; or of the hot, fervent, impulsive Pike; or of the ardent, passionate, vehement Folsom; or of the fearless, daring, brave Noteware, or of the intrepid, undaunted, courageous Wheeler; or of the audacious, impudent, aggressive Davis, who kept the columns of the APPEAL, volcanic during the campaign; or of the suitable, acceptable, pleasing, young Congressman from Washoe; or of the wily, willing, watchful Foster; or of the clever, ready, accomplished Currier; or of the reliable, confident, certain McCarthy; or of the sapient, discreet, sagacious Gignoux; or of the wise, sage, conscientious La-Grave; or of the attentive, observant, vigilant McNaughton; or of the safe, swift, satisfactory Sharon; and the hundreds of others who made the hills and valleys echo and re-echo with Nevada's grand cry for freedom and prosperity for herself and untold benefit for suffering humanity, in every State of the Union. The pioneers have nearly all entered the Valley of the shadow, their remains lie scattered around where the music of the stamps lulls them to peaceful slumber. Those who yet survive should be more merciful and charitable than those who failed to build up their offerings, for the present security and future prosperity of Nevada

as a State depends upon its young men, and I hope I may realize the expectancy of the next quarter of a century to witness the development of commonwealth to a condition of splendor and magnitude that the dome of the Capitol shall be studded with stars representing the valor, liberality, virtue, contentment and supreme happiness of all her people, achieved by the young architects and builders upon whom a new era has dawned and in whose wisdom, discretion, honesty and good judgment I have the most implicit and unreserved hope and faith.
