SIXTEENTH SESSION.

SENATE.

Called to order at 11 A. M. Lieut. Gov. Ponce, presiding.

S B 23, by Foley, To repeal sections 1 and 3 of Act relative to Military affairs in this State, approved March 19, 1891. Military.

Message from the Assembly returning, S B 18—Williams badger bill—on account of defect in enacting clause. Agriculture.

Message received from the Governor approving of Senate Joint Res. No. 2, relative to payment of the rebellion war claims of this State. Adjourned.

ASSEMBLY.

Called to order at the regular hour by speaker Bell in the chair.

Roll call and all present.

Prayer by the Chaplain.

Reading and adoption of minutes.

Journal read and approved.

Reports of various Standing committees.

Pike moved to reconsider the vote taken Saturday on S B No. 4, which prescribes that contracts and obligations hereafter made may be payable in either gold or silver.

Debated at considerable length and vote to reconsider carried. Made a special order for Wednesday at 2 p. m.

By Harris, A B 44, An Act authorizing County Commissioners to cut or change the channels of rivers and ditches in emergencies to prevent destruction of property.

By Folsom A B 45, An Act authorizing Trustees of Carson City to contract for sewers, water supplies etc.

By Folsom, A B 46, An Act to provide for the payment of a portion

of the licence tax on the selling of liquors into the treasury of incorporated cities (affects only Carson.)

By Massey, A B 47, An Act amending An Act providing for the payment of costs in contested land cases in the District Court.

Communication from Denver Colorado, Legislature, in relation to Silver and the bounty on beet sugar. Referred.

Recess taken till 1:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

S B 18—Relative to a bounty being granted for the destruction of certain noxious animals. Returned to Senate for correction as it had no enacting clause.

S B 13—Relative to election of U. S. Senators by direct vote of the people. Read first time second by title and referred to Com. on Fed. Rel.

S B 14—Act to prohibit sale of intoxicating liquors in Capitol. Referred to Com. on Pub. Morals.

Reports of various committees By McNaughton A B 48—Act to provide for copying Assembly Journal. (Appropriation \$175.)

By Massey—Resolution that the 16th session of the Legislature adjourn sine die on Feb. 24 1893. Amended by Wheeler that if the Legislature remain in session longer it be at the expense of the members. Amended by Pike to read Feb. 11. Whole subject matter tabled, after which several members explained why they voted as they did.

A B 14—Appropriating moneys to pay for the special election held in Esmeralda county. Read third time

A B 17—Act to provide revenue for the support of the government of the State. Ordered engrossed.

A B 42—Act refunding to W. W. Henny certain moneys from White Pine county treasury. Passed.

S B—Act amending an act consolidating certain county and township offices in Storey. Passed.

Nicaragua Canal Conference Committee. Moved by Pike that the Assembly refuse to concur in the amendment by the Senate for the appointment of a conference committee of five from each House to concur on the Pike amendment to the Nicaragua Canal Resolution Amended by Boston that the Assembly does concur. Original motion lost.

S B—An act amending an act in relation to the State Agricultural Society. Read first time and referred to committee on Agriculture.

S B 24, relative to local matters in White Pine county. Referred. Adjourned.

JONES' PLAN.

Senator Jones is reported as saying that he is in favor of sinking 1000 feet lower in the Gold Hill mines, pumping them out and striking for a new bonanza. This will cost half a million dollars and John Mackey is quoted as willing to share the expense.

The selling met with no material resistance, and declines were made all over the list.

Yesterday in the United States Senate a motion was made to take up the Sherman Repeal Bill.

It was lost by a vote of 42 to 23. First blood for silver.

Thursday, the students at State University petitioned the faculty for a day's vacation, in order to give them an opportunity to visit the legislative halls at the Capitol and note the modus operandi of making laws for the government of the State. The petition was granted and next Friday set aside as the visiting day.

Constitutional Amendments.

Most of yesterday was spent in arguments before the Supreme Court relative to the validity of the constitutional amendments.

The question of publication was principally dwelt upon. The Attorney General was assisted by Mr. Wren who insisted that being printed in the Statutes was publication, but Gen. Clarke took the ground that it was required to publish them regularly in a newspaper. The question will probably be decided today.

The Printing Contract.

As requested at a previous meeting Dist. Atty McGowan Monday filed a brief in relation to the contracts with the Tribune and News. He held in effect that to disturb the contracts would result in endless litigation to the county, and they should be carried out.

In order to set aside the contracts an injunction suit will be necessary.


