NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

SIXTEENTH SESSION.

SENATE.

Called to order at 11 a. m. Lieut. Gov. Pujade, presiding. Roll call, and all present. Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Clyne. Reading of the Journal etc.

Communication read from the Beet Sugar Association of Denver Colorado. Agriculture.

Con. Res. No. 6, from the Indiana Legislature relative to election of United States Senator by the people, received. Federal Relation.

Report of State Librarian received. Education.

Report of Adjutant-General received. Military.

FIRST READING AND REFERENCE OF BILLS.

S B 30, by Maute, Amendatory of Act to consolidate certain State officers. Printing.

S B 32, by Foley, To provide for determination of liabilities of claims against counties. Judiciary.

S B 33, by Williamson, To provide revenue for the State of Nevada. Min. and Mining.

S B 18 William's badger bill, Vote by which it passed reconsidered. Bill withdrawn by its introducer.

S B 11, by Gignoux, Supplementary of Act regulating proceedings in Criminal Cases. Ordered engrossed.

A B 21, by Massey, Relief of Jacob Eggea, Assessor of Elko county, \$138 for 46 poll-tax receipts lost in mail transmission for which no tax had been collected. Referred to committee of the Whole.

A B 31, by Russell, To provide for Copying, Engrossing and Enrolling in the Assembly. Assistance called for in each department. Passed 12 to 3.

S B 29, Foley, To authorize Washoe County Commissioners to issue bonds in aid of construction of a public park in Reno. Ordered engrossed.

At 12:20 recess was taken till 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

S B 23, by Comins—Relative to reports of State officers. Ordered re engrossed.

S B 25, by Patchen—Fixing salaries of Lincoln county officials. Passed.

S Joint Res 1, by Comins—Niagara Canal; Assembly free coinage amendment concurred in.

S B 25, by Forbes—Taxing sheep. Ways and Means.

S B 34 by Rickey—To reimburse Lieut. Gov. Pujade for moneys necessarily expended for care of State Library, while absent engaged in other duties. Com. of the Whole.

S B 35 by Rickey—To pay deficiencies in State Government appropriations for years 1891-92. Com. of the Whole.

ASSEMBLY.

Called to order at the regular hour by speaker Bell in the chair.

Roll call and all present. Prayer by the Chaplain.

Reading and adoption of minutes. Journal read and approved.

Reports of various Standing committees.

Report of special conference committee on the Assembly amendment to the Niagara Canal resolution that the committee had agreed to recommend the passage of the Fike amendment.

A B 49, by Russell, an act to define the manner of electing County Commissioners (provides for commissioner districts.)

A B 50, by Massey, (by request,) an act to amend section 35 of an act entitled an act relating to officers and their duties etc., approved March 9, 1876

A B 51, by Norcross, (by request,) an act in relation to the settlement of estates of husband and wife.

A B 52 by Bell, an act to require the assessors to report to the County Commissioners the number of live stock in their several counties.

A B 32, an act concerning Grand Juries and prescribing the manner in which they shall be drawn, (reduces number to 12, ten of which shall sit.) Read third time and passed.

A B No. 39, An Act in relation to public roads and highways. (The bill not being printed, the third

reading and final passage postponed until printed.)

A B No. 23, An Act prescribing the number of Grand Jurors who shall find a true bill, or indictment. (Prescribes seven.)

A B No. 28, An Act authorizing the issuance of bonds to the amount of \$5,000, for fire purposes in Wadsworth. Bill ordered engrossed.

A B No. 46, An Act to provide a bounty for the destruction of certain noxious animals (pocket gophers.) Passed. House took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Committee on mileage rendered their report. Mileage reduced from 25 cents to 12 1/2 cents.

There was a long squabble over Griffin's mileage bill and nothing done. Referred to Judiciary Com.

McNaughton's substitute for A B No. 7 adopted.

A B 53 by Folsom—Act to compensate Gen. Lewis for services, as Porter. Com. on Contingent Expenses.

A B 54, by Smith—Act relative to State detectives. Com. on Public Morals.

A B 55 by Manning—Gaming Act. Ways and Means.

A B 20—Contagious diseases among sheep. Passed; 28 to 1.

S B 22—State Agricultural Society bill. Passed unanimously.

S B 24—Justice of the Peace in Eureka. Passed.

S B 39—Amended and ordered engrossed.

Adjourned.

TREMBLEY OUTCLASSED.

Whipped by Meyers in 22 Rounds.

The glove contest at the Opera House last evening drew a large audience.

It required some time to select a referee, and the men were not in the ring until 10:30.

It was a fight that gave the best of satisfaction to the audience, and the best man won.

Meyers forced the work from the start. He stated to his backers that he would win in four rounds, but he found his man tougher than he expected.

Meyers is shifty on his feet, quick in delivery, and a punisher.

Trembley has great endurance, stands punishment as if he liked it, dodges well and has great ability to take care of himself in a clinch, but this is more than offset by clumsiness of delivery, slowness on his feet and utter lack of any punishing quality. He was clearly outclassed, but was game to the last and his backers are satisfied that he did his best.

The blow that settled him to the floor for good was a right hander under the ear.

Meyers did considerable foul fighting and in the 21st round struck his man as he was rising from the floor.

Under the rules a fallen man is allowed time to regain his feet. Trembley was not allowed this time, as he should have been.

Surveyor General Jones has received the following:

Pittsfield, Feb. 1, 1893.

Mr. J. L. Jones,

Dear Sir:—Accept my thanks for Report of State Land Register of Nevada. I have tried several times to find something in regard to the situation of things in your State. I was there and voted to make it a State, and was one of the first to file in the Land Office at Carson. I liked the city and the climate; was there almost two years, but had to come East on business, and circumstances have kept me here, but I have been paying the taxes on my 160 acres. It is just south of the city, opposite Flinn Co. land, 160 rods from the city limits, as they were then.

How would it do to lay out a park or build a hospital and boom the town as a health resort for pulmonary and catarrhal troubles? If the thing was done right we could get a crowd of people to settle there.

Would the people there help such an enterprise in the way of helping get up a stock company, or something of that kind? I intend to make a trip out there soon and look things over. Yours truly,


