

INDEPENDENCE WON IT.

Does any reasonable mind conceive that the late votes in congress upon the silver question would have been possible had Republicans and Democrats stood by Harrison and Cleveland at the late election?

Over a million votes were given to Weaver. Nine hundred thousand of those who cast them were party men therefore, who felt that Wall street influences had overawed both national conventions, and that to vote for either of the candidates was to aid in fastening the rule of Wall street upon the country for a quarter of a century.

Colorado cast 50,000 of just such votes. The influence that carried Colorado radiated into every state of the West and South, and gave free coinage men everywhere courage to abandon their party candidates, and vote for Weaver as a rebuke to their party's treachery.

The majority in congress against the repeal of the Sherman law represents the influence of three million voters throughout the country. Politicians know they are but the vanguard of an army five times that number who restrained from breaking loose by deceptive promises, but who are at heart as eager for the relief free coinage will give as those who made the Weaver forces.

What man in Colorado regrets his vote for Weaver? To every party who abandoned his party candidate for the nominee of the Omaha convention, is due a share of the victory that saves Colorado and the country from such a financial calamity as never before afflicted either.

Here are the fruits of their boldness. Had they faltered, had they hesitated on election day, the Sherman law would be now repealed and silver and business would collide in one great destructive avalanche.

Reflect, voters of Colorado. Had your votes been divided between Harrison and Cleveland; had the despised Populists of Kansas and Nebraska, of Alabama and Arkansas, of Dakota and Wyoming been less brave and succumbed to the jeers and threats of the two dominant parties, the public sentiment in the West and South that coerces a majority in congress to defy the powers of the president in a president-elect and the money of Wall street would not be felt and silver would have gone down with a rush and an hurrah.

Stand by your guns. The fight has only commenced. The Sherman law is but a makeshift. Free coinage is the goal. It can never be reached except through courageous independence.—Denver News.
