NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

SIXTEENTH SESSION.

FIFTIETH DAY. SENATE.

Called to order at 10 a. m. Lieut-Gov. Ponce, presiding. Roll call, quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Hyslop. Reading of the Journal etc. Resolution by Comins, Relative to protection of the mining industry. Tabled. S B 87, by McDonell, Salary of District Judge. Passed. S B 191, Stearns, Road tax. Passed. S B 96, by Boyle, To provide for traveling expenses of Adjutant General. Passed. S. C. R. No. 5, by Comins, Protection of the mining industry of Nevada. Calls on our Senators and Representatives in Congress to secure hard money. Passed. S B 95, from Ways and Means, Reducing salaries and compensations of certain State officers and attaches. Passed. A B 16, by Hammill, Preservation of fish in the waters of this State. Passed as amended. Recess.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

S B 98, Authorize and direct an appropriation of county Commissioners for encampment and other public holidays. Considered engrossed. Passed. S B 99, Provide revenue for the support of certain counties in the State. Considered engrossed read the third time and passed. Resolved that Senators Folsom, Maute and president of the Senate read the Senate journal on the last day. A B 92, Amend An Act relative to levying and assessing taxes for State and county purposes. Passed. A B 64, An Act to provide for a complete walk around the capitol square. Referred to Committee of the whole. A B 85, An Act to provide support for the government of the State of Nevada. Passed. A B 120, Act relative to military encampments. Passed. A B 61, Act incorporating banks, institut on for organizations. Indefinitely postponed. A B 124, To prevent contagious diseases. Board of Health. Indefinitely postponed. Lost. Bill passed. A B 56 Act providing for collection of display at Columbian Fair. Tabled. Recess. The following bills were passed in the Senate last night: A B 131—Street railway in Reno. The bill for the completion of the walk around the Capitol. Bill appropriating \$10,000 for an exhibit at the World's Fair. The matter of submitting the question of a Constitutional Convention to the people was lost.

ASSEMBLY.

Called to order at the regular hour by speaker Bell in the chair. Roll call and all present. Prayer by the Chaplain. Reading and adoption of minutes. Reports of various committees. By Griffin, concurrent resolution submitting to the people the question of calling a Constitutional Convention. GENERAL FILE. S B 84, An Act extending the time of the franchise of the Air Line Railroad four years longer. Referred to Committee of the Whole reported favorably and passed. A B 130, An Act in relation to public roads and highways. Passed. A B—An Act to provide settees for the State capitol. A B 79, An Act to allowed school children living more than 5 miles from a public school to draw their proportional share of school money if educated in a private school. S B 81, An Act reducing and regulating the salaries of certain State officers. Fixes deputies salaries at \$100 per month after Jan. 1 1895. Passed. S B 82, An Act for submitting the Constitutional Amendments to the people at the general election in Nov. 1894. Passed. A B 84, An Act increasing the license for selling liquors to \$60, per

Mr. Lernhart and Mr. Pike entered and Mr. Lernhart asked that his name be called. Objected to by Mr. McNaughton that he should not be allowed to vote, as the rules say that nothing can interrupt a roll call. Question after some discussion decided by the Speaker that Mr. Lernhart and Pike should be allowed to vote. Mr. Lernhart voted "Aye" which carried the resolution. month. Laid on table. S. C. R. No. 2, Amending Constitution allowing a lottery. Recess.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

S B—An act submitting to the people the question of having a lottery. Ayes and noes being taken and 15 votes recorded in the affirmative. Before the vote was announced Mr. Pike then refused to vote. Mr. McNaughton and Norcross appealed from the decision of the chair. The chair stated that he hoped the House would not sustain his decision, although he believed it correct. Mr. Harris showed that as the vote had been announced the appeal was out of order. So held. Following is the vote on the resolution: Ayes, Allen, Boston, Folsom, Hulp, Logan, Lechin, Logan, Manning, Massey, McCarthy, Monahan, Reynolds, Richards and Smith, 16. Noes, Carah, Foster, Foulks, Griffin, Hamill, Harris, Melarkey, McNaughton, Norcross, Russell, Thies, Wheeler and Bell, 12. S B 93—An Act for the carrying of the State Government on a cash basis. Provides that the State may make temporary loans from the State School funds to carry on State Government and State Institutions when ever the Treasury is temporarily depleted, before taxes come in. Carried. A B 35—An act to limit the powers of County Commissioners in appropriating money. Senate amendments concurred in. Most of the time of both houses last evening was taken up by unimportant matters, which the APPEAL has not the space to chronicle.

THE CLOSING HOURS.

The Silver Legislature Adjourns At Midnight.

The closing hours of the Sixteenth Legislature were marked by the usual good feeling, presentations jolly speechmaking, and Third House hilarity, such as it was. In the House Speaker Bell was presented with an elegant gold headed cane. Mr. Massey made the presentation speech which was full of flowers of rhetoric and was loudly applauded. Mr. Bell was taken completely by surprise but lit on his feet in a happy rejoinder and the Chief Clerk Bowler presented on behalf of the House an elegant solid gold chain, to "Pike Speaker Pro Tem. The presentation speech was in Bowler's usual vein and Pike made a very felicitous response and all the speeches were loudly applauded. All who spoke mentioned the fact that they all disclaimed any feeling in the hot debates and that the session would dissolve as merrily as a marriage bell. Mr. Russell, the one and only Democrat made a happy talk and forgave everybody everything that had been said. Mr. Massey also recalled all the lively language he had indulged in. All hands insisted that the storm was over and it was only sunshine. Mr. Folsom and Mr. Foulks and several others talked in the same strain and the attaches were also highly complimented. The Governor sent in a pleasant farewell message and at 12 o'clock the hammer fell, all separating in the kindest feeling. A vote of thanks was tendered the attaches. In the Senate the same pleasant feeling prevailed. President Ponce declined any gift and was the recipient of a happy set of resolutions and Mr. Williamson, President Pro Tem was the recipient of similar courtesies. All made delightful speeches and parted warm friends.

A Speaker Impeached.


