

THE SESSION.

No Legislative session ever adjourned in Nevada leaving a better record behind it than the one which has just closed its labors at the Capitol.

The members went before the people on well defined platforms, the pledges in which have been carried out to the letter.

There has been retrenchment and reform whenever it could be consistently made and in all actions of the Legislature the needs and welfare of the taxpayers have been carefully considered.

The session has been characterized by no scandals, there were no cinch bills introduced or in fact any of the petty blackmailing measures which have characterized previous gatherings of the Legislative bodies in this State.

Not a single bill was passed by bribery, in fact there was not even the rumor of a single dollar having been spent to influence votes on any measure.

The session was shortened ten days in the interest of economy and the members can go home to their constituents conscious of the fact that they have been true to the trust confided in them by the people.

The Legislature has been an honor and a credit to the Silver Party and it means that the Silver Party in Nevada has come to stay.

LOST IN THE SHUFFLE.

The Deputy Salary Bill Mysteriously Disappears.

There was considerable excitement in the Capitol yesterday over the mysterious disappearance of Assembly Bill 77, which reduced the salaries of the State deputies.

The history of the bill shows that Assistant Clerk Pratt delivered the bill to Mr. Foster, Chairman of the Enrolling Committee on Sunday last in the morning. The original bill had six amendments attached as riders.

On Monday Mr. Foster reported that Bills 79, 77, 107, 57, 86, 31, 88, 98, 96 and 101 had been enrolled and transmitted to the Governor.

The Governor's Private Secretary has a book in which he makes a minute of the bills which reach his office, and A. B. 77 does not appear on this book.

The Governor and Secretary are positive the bill never reached the office.

Miss Lyons and Miss Stearns enrolled the Assembly Bills, but both ladies are willing to make affidavit that they did not enroll the bill in question. Miss Lyons did not work at all that Sunday.

Mr. Foster says that he received the bills from Mr. Pratt in a bunch of nine, and passed them over to the enrolling clerks. He supposed that they were all enrolled, but cannot recollect that particular one.

Mr. Foster is a honorable man, to whom no suspicion is attached in the matter.

It was also discovered that the minutes which recorded the history of the bill had also disappeared; they had already been copied, however.

The probable solution of the matter is that after the bills were left with the enrolling clerks, some one slipped in and abstracted the one in question. The clerks enrolled the eight bills and Mr. Foster when he received the bunch did not count them and reported the entire list enrolled.

It is most probable that the bill was stolen from the Enrolling Clerk's room and that the man who did it got paid for his work. Suspicion is attached to one man who is regarded as up to that sort of business, but the proofs so far are very meagre. The matter should be thoroughly investigated and if found, the culprit should be made an example of. The loss of the bill does not benefit anyone as the appropriation for deputy salaries was reduced to accord with the bill.

We find in one of our Reno contemporaries the following report of how a bill fared in the Senate:

A. B. No. 124—To prevent contagious diseases. Board of Health. Indefinitely postponed. Lost. Bill passed.

There was a general exodus of members yesterday.
