THE BI-METALLIC LEAGUE.

How Nevada was Represented at the Washington Meeting.

At the recent meeting of the United Bi-metallic League at Washington, Nevada was represented as follows on the various committees:

On Credentials, W. D. Duval, Rules and Order of business, C. D. Van Duzer; Resolutions, F. G. Newlands and H. F. Bartine; Permanent Organization, C. D. Van Duzer; Ways and Means, Wm. M. Stewart and C. D. Van Duzer; Finance, this was a special Committee of three and consisted of A. C. Flak of Colorado, R. G. Davis of Montana and C. D. Van Duzer of Nevada.

ADDRESS OF WILLIAM M. STEWART.

President Warner introduced William M. Stewart as the foremost silver champion of America. Senator Stewart made one of the ablest addresses ever delivered by him. He was well warmed up and spoke for two and one half hours and when he showed signs of relaxation was urged by his hearers to continue.

He traced much of the history of financial legislation. Between 1850 and 1875 the country saw wonderful prosperity, with rising prices. Since 1875, he said, the country has been burdened by hard times brought on by legislation.

Senator Stewart, in conclusion, said that the Secretary of the Treasury, when he wanted to learn the wishes of the people, usually visited New York bankers. Not only did he do this, but he used his influence to send commissioners to Europe to beg of foreign governments the permission to exercise the right of legislation.

Wall street, the Senator said, nominated both candidates of the political parties for President, and from neither man need the friends of silver expect anything.

Delivered one of his able and eloquent addresses, which created the wildest enthusiasm. He looked the picture of health, and in his quiet and eloquent way deeply interested his hearers, who frequently interrogated him on important topics of the question.

Speaking of this conference, Senator Jones said that not much had been accomplished, nor much expected. He had not expected the appointment, but he went to tell the European delegates what the masses of the United States wanted and what they were going to get.

The involuntary idleness of the masses of the people was filling the insane asylums and making criminals. With a shrinking currency the wealth of the country all gravitated toward the centers. It was a strange thing

then when a man drew a prize of a million in this country he went to New York, withdrawing his money from productive industry, and began to call himself and those around him the business men of the country.

He for one had made up his mind that he would resist the repeal of the Sherman law until something better was gained, for he thought that the purchase 54,000,000 ounces of silver saved many farmers from bankruptcy each year.

Senator Jones spoke for an hour, and when he had finished he received an ovation from the delegates. The convention took a recess, and all the members pressed around him cheering and shaking hands.

It was wonderful to see the interest manifested when Senators Stewart and Jones spoke. The convention realized that they were the foremost champions of the white metal in the world.

Unfortunately Francis G. Newlands, on account of indisposition of health was unable to be present. His physician strictly forbade his attendance to any business at present.
