**VANISHING MONIES.**

**How a \$10,000 Estate Gradually Evaporated.**

Recently the County Clerk of Oremby received a letter from George E. list of Chicago, who is the principle heir to the estate of Thomas Sheehan who died in Empire in 1876 and left property valued at \$10,000. A good deal of this was mining stock which the Court ordered sold for the benefit of the estate. The signature of the will was not attested and the Legislature passed an act recognizing the validity of the will as the signature was believed to be genuine. George E. list was the principle heir and although it has been over sixteen years since the estate passed into the hands of the Administrator, Elliot has not yet received a dollar of his money.

This seems to be rather a long time for the Administrator to hang on to the estate.

The Wade King and Ellsworth estates are still in an unsettled condition and it is generally supposed that the Frazer estate is in the same fix.

Letters of administration were granted in the King case over a year ago and the estate only amounted to \$422. Some years before his death parties in this city gave him permission to move his little house on their ground which he did with the understanding that it would always be his. Now the owners of the ground have filed a claim against the estate claiming the house.

It is a well known fact that he had notes against several people for money borrowed and these notes should be found among his effects, but to date they have not turned up.

Perhaps the fact that parties were seen by the neighbors climbing into the back window of the house soon after the death of the poor half-witted man, may account for the peculiar disappearance of these notes.

The Ellsworth estate has been dragging along in the same way for about two years.

Section 2224 of the bound Statutes provides that on the first Monday of July and the first Monday of January of each year the Administrator shall make a report of all receipts and expenditures and condition of the estates and the same shall be posted or published.

This law has not been complied with in these estates.

**The Telephone Patent.**

The principal patent of the Bell Telephone Company expired yesterday, and it is probable that within the next few days a host of competing concerns will spring up in different parts of the country. The patent which expired yesterday is based upon the transmission of sound by the undulating current, and is the famous fifth claim of the Bell monopoly which has withstood scores of legal onslaughts that have been made upon it during the past decade.

The opinion has gained considerable currency that from this on the Bell company would be on an equal footing with any other concern that might choose to go into the telephone business, but this is far from the case, and it is not at all likely that the expiration of the patent in question will tend to loosen the grip of the company upon the telephone-using public. For years the company has had an agent in the Patent Office at Washington, and every valuable device in telephoning has been purchased.

While the foundation patent has expired there are a large number of auxiliary devices, such as the carbon transmitter, the automatic arrangement for closing and opening the current through the local transmitter, and the universal switch-board that are essential to the operation of large exchanges and are covered by the Bell patents. The independent companies will be able to operate comparatively small exchanges without using the Bell patents and paying the extortionate royalty that has been charged for them.

**A Busy Railroad Season.**

According to the Silver State, business has commenced picking up on the Central Pacific and it is expected that the coming season will be the busiest the road has ever experienced. The number of crews on the Truckee division will probably be doubled within the next few months, which will be an era of prosperity for the railroad boys.




