BEEF CATTLE.

An Actual Shortage of Them in the Country.

The prospects of cattle raisers continue to improve and the backbone of those who have stayed in the business is beginning to show signs of stiffening. Stock journals in Texas and Wyoming say that from all quarters comes the cry of an actual shortage of beef cattle, and the idea is rapidly gaining wide prevalence that before the year closes beef values will be greatly advanced. There is good ground for this idea in the west, the great range area is almost depleted of its shepherds, and its future output of beef steers must come very largely from the importations of southern cattle. Unfortunately the south has of late caught the prevailing idea that it did not pay to breed cattle, and the great shepherds of Texas and New Mexico have been discriminated by the spaying of heifers and the shipment of cows until the supply of young steers is really below the demand. Beef values will advance for three years if there is any dependence to be placed in the shadows that are cast before, but there will be no famine as some of our friends pretend to believe. This is a good time to "hold on" to your cattle and increase the size of your herd by all legitimate means. Keep out of debt, but get all the cattle you can pay for and properly take care of.

The Hoeflich Estate.

San Francisco, April 20.—Judge Coffey made an order yesterday appointing Solomon Hoeflich administrator of the estate of his brother, Morris Hoeflich. It will be remembered that Solomon Hoeflich came hither about a year ago to take charge of the estate. He has been talking about making some startling revelations concerning some prominent citizens.

Morris Hoeflich was a well-known mining stock speculator. He had been a millionaire, but wine, women and other expensive luxuries had reduced him to financial straits, and, while on the verge of paresis, he went to a room in Samuel Rosener's house on O'Farrell street and shot himself through the heart. The public administrator found that he left an insurance policy for \$10,000 and about \$2900 worth of personal property. Solomon Hoeflich asserts that the estate was looted and says he has evidence showing that his brother left several hundred thousand dollars' worth of stocks and bonds in the hands of brokers. He says that he will show that H. M. Levy knew all about his brother's business, and he is now trying to prevent an investigation. He expects to show Levy up in a very unenviable light. He says that Levy admitted that he destroyed a number of papers, but that they were compromising letters from women.

Good Wine.

SEMBLANS' JOKES.

Where That Relating to "Patent Outsides" Was First Printed.

To an inquirer the Journal would say that the comment on a "patent outside" newspaper "one-half printed in Chicago and the other half printed in Winnemucca," appeared in 1874 in Measure for Measure, a paper printed in Battle Mountain and edited by W. J. Forbes, (Semblans) one of the wittiest newspaper men that ever penned a paragraph. It was "Semblans" who summarized the report of a special agent of the interior department, sent to examine a saw mill and dam, for which an appropriation had been made, and which the department was led to believe had been built on the Pyramid reservation on the Truckee river, as follows:

"TO THE HONORABLE, THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, WASHINGTON, D. C., SIR:—I have the honor to report that I visited the Pyramid Lake Indian Reservation on the Truckee river, Nevada Territory, and found a dam by a mill site, but no mill by a damn site."—Journal.

San Jose, April 20.—Cora J. Silva, aged 20 years, an accomplished young lady, who has resided in the family of Mrs. M. J. Marshall on the Alameda for several months, committed suicide this morning at 9 o'clock by taking poison.

She was seated in a chair, apparently engaged in reading a paper. Suddenly she cried out to Mrs. Marshall, who was in the room, "I've taken poison!" No vial or paper was found to indicate the nature of the drug. The girl left no letter giving any reason for the act.


