District Court.

The Court convened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, with Judge Rising presiding.

In the matter of the estate of R. S. Rodman, deceased, the balance remaining in the estate, \$383, was ordered paid to Miss Lizzie Murphy, in accordance with the will of the late Postmaster.

In the Stevenson estate an order was made confirming the sale of certain property for \$2,500.

In the Bland estate the sale of the property was confirmed.

The estates of W. W. King, Frank Simpkins and Ben Ellsworth, were all settled and Administrator Hawkins discharged.

R. Sadler was appointed executor of the estate of W. Sadler, with bond fixed at \$500.00.

In the matter of the estate of Henrietta Bullock and Wilson Miller, a minor, a petition was filed asking for letters of administration and guardianship.

The case of the executors of the Wright estate against T. D. Dempsey, involving the genuineness of an alleged signature of Tim Dempsey to a promissory note, resulted in a verdict for the defendant, and a judgment against plaintiff for costs.

The jury consisted of Messrs. Elstner, Heritage, Toupin, Atherton, Gilbert, Decker, Morris, Kitzmeyer, Eckman, Christensen and Cushing. They were out about fifteen minutes.

The case of Regent Mack against Attorney-General Torreyson, involving the legality of the latter's serving on the Board of Regents, was argued in the afternoon. The defendant was given five days to answer, and the plaintiff three days to reply.

Adjourned to May 8th.

A Horrible Accident.

At the shops of the Wagner Manufacturing Company, 134 Main street, Thursday, Gus Gonzales, a twenty-four-year-old apprentice, while working at a turning lathe, was struck down suddenly by a loosened chisel and almost instantly killed.

He had just started his lathe running, when the chisel, tearing loose from its fastenings, flew out at right angles to the machine and struck Gonzales full in the chest, just over the heart.

The machine was going at frightful speed—nearly 5,000 revolutions to the minute—and when the chisel struck the unfortunate man it pierced flesh and bone and came very near to coming out at his back.

As soon as the chisel struck him Gonzales, with a cry, fell like a log, while a torrent of bright red blood gushed from his chest.

The man was taken to the Receiving Hospital. He was unconscious from the time the chisel struck him, and on the way out to the hospital it was thought that he would die from loss of blood.

Arriving at the hospital he was at once put on the operating table. Every time he breathed blood gushed from the ghastly wound. In ten minutes after he was put on the table Gonzales died.—S. F. Report.

A Mining Horror.

Butte, Mont., April 21—A fire broke out in one of the shafts of the Butte & Boston Company this morning. Nine miners were cut off from escape and others are burned or suffocated. All hope of rescue has been abandoned. Their names are Ed. Pascoe, Richard Trembath, Thomas Gray, James Netto, Auronio Beara and E. Puglis. The origin of the fire is not known.

They May Starve.

Sheboygan, Mich., April 20—The schooner Horace H. Badger, which left here on the 10th inst. for Drummonds island with 300 Italian laborers on board, was at last accounts fast in the ice at the foot of Lake Huron. It is feared that the Italians have run short of provisions, although no word has come from the schooner for several days.

Twelve Bodies Rescued.

Milwaukee, April 21.—The bodies of two victims of the tunnel crib horrors were picked up on the beach early this morning. The steamer Burroughs went to the crib this morning and rescued ten bodies. The foreman, Barber, of the tunnel construction gang, says there were fifteen men in the crib when it was overwhelmed.

Nobe Jellerson Surprised.

When Nobe Jellerson reached home Thursday evening he found his residence filled with a jolly lot of people who had gathered to give Nobe a little surprise, the occasion being his 59th birthday. Nobe nearly fainted, and it was some minutes before he regained his usual composure.

A crowd of hoodlums at Topeka, Kan., gave a newly married couple a charivari, and one of the party fired into the house. This so enraged Anderson, the groom, that he fired into the crowd, instantly killing two hoodlums and fatally injuring a cowboy.


