Cruelty to Animals.

If Alexander De Kent, the great horse fancier and animal trainer, of France, who never struck a dumb beast in his life, could witness some of the cruelties to horses, practiced in this town, his big heart would burst with remorse.

Yesterday in the north end of town some young men beat an overburdened horse so severely that it fell prostrate to the ground and they attempted to make a straw fire under the helpless creature in order to rouse it. The straw would not burn and the animal finally struggled to its feet in sheer terror. This has happened repeatedly of late and if the brutal pastime is indulged in again, steps will be taken to deal out just punishment.

On one occasion a horse's nose was twisted so severely with a bailing rope, that one of the boys remarked the possibility of pulling the nose off. The reply of the brute with the rope was to the effect that he "didn't care a damn" whether he did or not and that the horse "had to pull the load anyhow." This sight was witnessed by several ladies who were helpless to do anything in the matter.

A society for the prevention of cruelty ought to be at once established in this city so that fiends who use the butt end of blacksnakes, sharp sticks, clubs and fire to make animals work, may be yanked into the courts and prosecuted so severely that they'll wish they never saw an animal.

LAYER—Since the above was written word was brought to this office that more cruelties were being indulged in and the Sheriff was at once notified, who in company with an APPEAL reporter visited the place. The last animal beaten had been taken out of harness and another substituted. The Sheriff was informed by several neighbors that the affair was cruel, brutal and deserving of punishment.

Ordinance No 95.

An Ordinance amending Section one of Ordinance No. 83, regulating fixing and imposing a license on exhibitions of sparring or boxing within the Corporate limits of Carson City, so as to read as follows:

Section 1.—The rate of license for each exhibition or entertainment of sparring or boxing given in any room, hall or building, or any place or grounds within the corporate limits of Carson City, Nevada, where an admission fee is charged, shall be thirty (30) dollars for each of such exhibitions or entertainment of sparring or boxing.

Section 2.—Section one of ordinance No. 83, is hereby repealed.

Very Near a Disaster.

Chicago, May 1.—During the dedication ceremonies there was a fearful crash in the crowd in front. Those in the rear pressed on those in front to get within hearing distance. These in turn pressed harder on those before them and so on, until near the front of the jam became terrific. The Columbian Guards were utterly unable to cope with the surging mass and those in front pushed into the reporters' quarters. Finally came cries of rage and pain until the head and shoulders of a woman in a swoon, with ashen lips and disheveled clothing was upborne above the heads of the throng, and then the fainting form of a boy was held aloft in the sinewy black arms of a stalwart negro. It was becoming a serious matter, and the blind persistence of the eager throng threatened death and panic. The attention of the people on the stand was attracted to it. President Cleveland watched it narrowly, and finally a mounted cavalryman made the difficult passage through the throng for egress with the fainting ones, and a battalion United States regulars widened the space, pushing the crowd back with the butts of muskets. Meantime the preceding ended and a serious disaster was averted.

As the President concluded the vast throng saw him extend his hand to the button of the golden key, which released the pent-up steam in the great engines, and set them ringing and unfurled the myriad flags from the great building, and the stupendous enterprise commemorating the 400th anniversary of Columbus's great achievement was in full swing. The President and officials were then entertained at luncheon and made the rounds of the buildings.

A New Deal.

Columbus, O., April 29.—George Jeremiah of this city, has just applied for a patent on a device for the killing of condemned persons. He claims that its operation will be as nearly painless as is compatible with certainty and quickness. It consists of a chair with a head rest that moves upon a hinge to the chair proper. Seated in a chair, the victim lays his head back in a leatherlined helmet, which, being locked, holds the head like a vice. The body is similarly clamped in the chair. A trigger releases a spring, which throws the chair seat one way and the helmet the other. The neck of the victim is dislocated by the torsion movement, much as a chicken's neck is sometimes wrung. The inventor claims that this method will soon supersede hanging and other barbarous methods of capital punishment.

Crushed to Death.

New York, April 30.—An old house being torn down at the corner of Broadway and Beaver streets, Williamsburg, collapsed suddenly this morning and buried in the ruins two children playing on the sidewalk. One, a little girl, was dead when dug out. The other, a boy, was terribly injured and will die.




