**FACTS FROM THE FAIR IN CHICAGO.**

The Appeal's Special Reporter  
 Sees the Elephant.

Chicago, May 3.—I am once more  
 back in my room in the Leland Ho-  
 tel but cannot sleep the sleep of in-  
 nocence. Below me in the crowded  
 streets the din and racket is holding  
 supreme sway. From the mouth of  
 the fakier and peanut man comes an  
 incessant yawping in a damnable  
 minor key pitched just high enough  
 to reach my window on the fourth  
 story.

I visited the building devoted to  
 mines, mining and agriculture to-day  
 and mixed indiscriminately with the  
 nabobs and aristocrats of all nations.  
 Bedlam has found her second edition  
 in this building and the jargon of the  
 Frenchman mixed with the prattle of  
 Italy, Germany, Austria, Batavia,  
 Japan and other foreign countries  
 gives the listener the snakes and  
 drives him mad.

Thousands of boxes labeled with  
 all sorts of colored plasters are still  
 piled indiscriminately upon the floor  
 waiting to be opened for exhibition.  
 Occasionally a Director comes upon  
 the scene and gives an order to have  
 something done. He then departs  
 as quickly as he appeared and almost  
 instantly he is followed by another  
 boss who makes another order in di-  
 rect conflict with the first man, but  
 someone tries to follow the advice of  
 both and the result is a grand mixing  
 up of boxes, crates and original pack-  
 ages.

The Nevada display of minerals  
 and agricultural products is located  
 in the center of the building and on  
 account of its size was readily placed  
 in position for inspection.

The Nevada headquarters are in  
 the Utah building where old Nava-  
 dans can find familiar faces and  
 good poker players.

The best drawing card so far has  
 been the pre-historic footprints from  
 Nevada, and thousands of people in-  
 spect them daily.

Contrary to the laws of the Fair  
 grounds, several amateur photo-  
 graphers have taken snap shot views  
 of the plaster casts and left the dis-  
 play triumphant.

The afternoon Joseph Pulitzer  
 elbowed his way through the crowd, set  
 his glasses upon his nose with a "this  
 is me" air and carefully inspected the  
 footprints. In a moment he removed  
 his glasses cast a satisfied wink at  
 Commissioner James A. Yerington  
 and remarked, "Horace Greeley had  
 a foot in that." Warren Dipple is  
 employed by the Nevada Commis-  
 sioners to answer questions and lie  
 about Esmeralda county. He is good  
 natured most of the time and very  
 homely all of the time. He has al-  
 ready been the cause of a terrific  
 eruption in the palace of arts and  
 sciences, and has spent most of the  
 time since keeping away from the  
 health bureau located on the grounds.  
 It seems that in a jam about the  
 famous painting of "The Angulus,"  
 by Millet the great French painter,  
 that a young lady's arm was so se-  
 verely wrenched that she fainted. The  
 gallant Dipple wafted the bystanders  
 aside and lifted the limp form from  
 the floor, rubbing her brow violently,  
 meanwhile calling for fresh air. Ex-  
 cited females and inquisitive men  
 pushed right and left to see the  
 trouble. Dipple was becoming  
 severely overburdened himself and  
 was wildly inquiring for more fresh  
 air. A big red-nosed rancher from  
 Idaho bent over him and ventured  
 the query, "What's the matter with  
 the young 'un." "My dear sir," re-  
 plied Dipple "this young lady has  
 just broken out with the smallpox  
 and she must have air."

In just one minute Dipple was  
 alone with his fair charge as the  
 crowd had made a break for the  
 doorway, spreading the news like

 and hung it on the office of the  
 Board of Health.

By this time the young lady had  
 recovered sufficiently to be moved  
 but Dipple has not been since. It is  
 hoped he will return sometime this  
 week as his services are about in-  
 dispensable with the Nevada Com-  
 mission and his record so far has  
 made him quite as attractive as Buf-  
 falo or Grover Cleveland.

**COAST NEWS.**

The dead body of a woman has  
 been found at Fort Bidwell horribly  
 mutilated.

William Beeson, a pioneer of  
 Jackson county, Or., dropped dead  
 in the field on his place after a vio-  
 lent quarrel with a workman.

The Northern Pacific Express Co.  
 at Tacoma has detectives at work  
 searching for a package containing  
 \$3,000 in gold, which was stolen  
 from the company's safe last week.

C. Weise, Sr. died Sunday night  
 his home near Glen Allen, after a  
 protracted illness. Deceased was a  
 prominent wine man and pioneer  
 of Samona Valley, having located  
 there in the early fifties.

Pearl Thomas, a female barber,  
 committed suicide by shooting Sun-  
 day night at Cascade, a few miles  
 west of Great Falls, Mont. She was  
 in love with a barber at the latter  
 place and disappointed at his mar-  
 riage to another woman was the  
 cause.

Ambrose Bierce, for whom a war-  
 rant of arrest on a charge of criminal  
 libel was issued at San Rafael last  
 week, appeared before Justice Gard-  
 ner yesterday and was admitted to  
 bail in the sum of \$1,000 with W.  
 R. Hearst and James Tunstead as  
 sureties.

Near Wildwood Glen Picnic  
 Grounds, San Rafael, yesterday, the  
 body of a man was found. The de-  
 ceased was a Frenchman and about  
 fifty-five years old. He had worn  
 gold-rimmed spectacles. The body  
 was dressed in a dark cloth coat and  
 vest, dark striped trousers, black  
 overcoat, English walking shoes,  
 white shirt, white socks, cotton-  
 flannel underwear and a checked,  
 calico necktie, and had been dead  
 several months.

**Murder and Suicide.**

London, May 2.—A frightful  
 tragedy is reported from the town of  
 Grosford, in Denbighshire, Wales.  
 Mrs. Whittle, a resident of that  
 place, and a groom named Shelland.  
 The groom had been off enjoying a  
 holiday. He returned to the house  
 of Mrs. Whittle yesterday evening.

He followed his mistress into her  
 bed chamber. A parlor maid, named  
 Taylor, also in the service of Mrs.  
 Whittle, was down stairs at the  
 time, but does not appear to have  
 feared anything unusual until she  
 heard a shot, evidently from a pis-  
 tol, in the bedchamber. The parlor  
 maid then ran to the room where her  
 mistress was, and found her in a dy-  
 ing condition from the effects of a  
 pistol shot.

The groom held a revolver in his  
 hand and when the maid appeared  
 he rushed upon her and pressed the  
 revolver to her head and threatened  
 to kill her. For some reason, how-  
 ever, he did not kill her, but con-  
 cluded to kill himself.

While she stood paralyzed with  
 fear Shelland turned away and,  
 kneeling down, offered up a prayer.  
 Then he turned the revolver upon  
 himself and fired. The girl ran out  
 to summon help. When she returned  
 with assistance it was found that  
 Shelland had cut the throat of his  
 dying mistress and lifted her body on  
 the bed. He had then laid down be-  
 side her and both were dead.

**Chicago Ho!**

An effort is being made in this city  
 to get up a sleeper load of Carson  
 people to go to the Fair. Mr. Ben-  
 der states that the passenger rate  
 prevailing at the time the car starts  
 will be charged, but that the sleeper  
 tickets will be furnished at half  
 rates.

**Under a Mass of Coal.**

Milwaukee, May 3.—The coal sheds  
 of the Northwestern Fuel Company  
 fell shortly before noon. Fifteen  
 men are buried under a great mass of  
 coal. All but six escaped without  
 injury. Some are injured internally  
 and cannot live.


