

A JUDICIAL RUMOR.

It was a matter of common talk on the street yesterday that Judge Rising had been urged by his friends to resign his office as District Judge and that he would have done so but for the fact that other friends of Rising were urging him not to resign because it was the intention of Governor Colcord to appoint Tremor Coffin to fill the unexpired term.

Certainly any man who would not be perfectly willing to have his record carefully scrutinized would not be fit to hold so responsible and honorable a position.
