

JUSTICE HAWTHORNE'S DECISION.

Yesterday the case of Bray vs. Ormsby County was tried in the Justice Court and the case was decided by Justice Hawthorne in favor of Bray.

The Auditor refused to draw the warrant because the statute expressly forbids any County Commissioner from being interested in a contract for improving or repairing roads.

It also provides that supplies may be purchased of a Commissioner, when not to do so would work a hardship on the county.

The Court decided that the gravel and dirt put on the road came under the head of "County Supplies."

Even the plaintiffs had not expected a decision on these ridiculous grounds and had therefore failed to show that not to employ Bray would have worked a hardship on anyone, especially as dozens of men were ready and anxious to do the same work.

How much of an "emergency" Bray considered the case to be is shown by his own testimony.

He was told to do the work on Friday and didn't lift a hand to it until the following Monday.

The decision of the Court puts Bray in a very peculiar position. It virtually admits that all his contracts above \$30 a month are illegal. As many of his contracts in past times were over \$100 they are all invalid, and nothing now remains for the District Attorney to do but to follow the instructions of the law and begin suit to recover all money paid to Bray in excess of \$30 a month for road work.

The taxpayers of the county need not, however, be alarmed over the decision of yesterday. The case will go at once to the District Court.
